Up and Down PP&L Asks The Avenue | Water Rate Never in my lifetime have Increase

PP&L filed application Fri., Sept. 12 with the Oregon PUC seeking approval for water rate increases.

PP&L operates water systems in Albany, Lebanon, Mill They are always demanding City, Independence and Prineville, serving some 13,000 customers. If approved, the rate incresse would produce an additional \$586,000 in annual revenues based on 1974 year end figures.

The utility was last granted water rate increases in 1972. PP&L division manager, Glen Spicer, said none of the water systems operated by Pacific are now providing an adequate earnings level. "In fact, even with increased rates as proposed, we would still be receiving a less than adequate rate of return on the Oregon water

If approved by the PUC, the minimum monthly residential charge would go from \$2.70 to \$4.05 in Albany; from \$3.00 to \$4.50 in Lebanon, Mill City
