Glenn Rice, of Macleay, was a dinner guest Wed., Sept. 24, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Taylor.

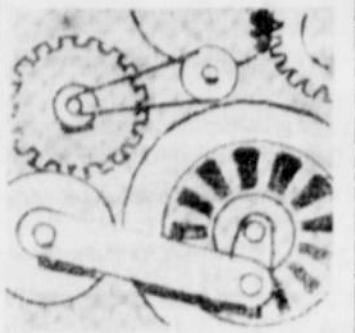

Pointless Invention
Tinkering in his basement, Arthur put together what he described as a "perpetual motion machine." He promptly applied for a patent, claiming that his contraption was an original.

But his application was rejected. And the rejection was duly upheld in a court hearing. The court said a patent must be not only original but also useful—and a perpetual motion machine cannot possibly be useful because it cannot possibly work.



In considering an inventor's right to a patent, courts will turn thumbs down on anything which (like Arthur's contraption) violates the laws of nature.

However, a patent may be granted if the principle is sound, even though the invention is still in primitive form. As one court noted, in upholding the patent on a crude improvement in printing, most great inventions have been rudimentary at the start. Said the court:

"Ten years after the inventions of Howe, the (sewing) machine first made by him would hardly have satisfied the least exacting sewing woman. The Dodds and Stephenson locomotive would, only a short time after its construction, have been discarded even by savages. The telephone of Bell is not the perfected telephone of commerce, the Morse telegraph is looked upon today as an interesting antique.

BLM-Managed Land Open To Hunters

The Bureau of Land Management's Salem District has reported that all national resource lands within the district will be open to hunting, subject to State of Oregon regulations during the hunting season.

B. T. Vladimiroff, district manager, cautioned that hunters use extreme care in the woods due to continued high fire danger throughout most of the district.

Vladimiroff noted that caution includes the normal safeguards practiced by most experienced hunters such as not leaving camp or warming fires unattended and the safe disposal of tobacco ashes.

Individuals using BLM recreational facilities after Sept. 29 are encouraged to carry out their own litter because of a minimal winter maintenance schedule. Public cooperation will avoid the nuisance of overflowing garbage cans and accumulated litter.

While the national resource lands within the Salem District are open to hunting, subject to state hunting regulations, one area in the district is closed to vehicular traffic with roads into that area cabled off and patrolled. This is in the Slick Rock area north of Stott Mountain, where BLM along with other governmental agencies as well as private industry have set aside an area to permit wildlife to range further afield to browse in an extensive cutover area.

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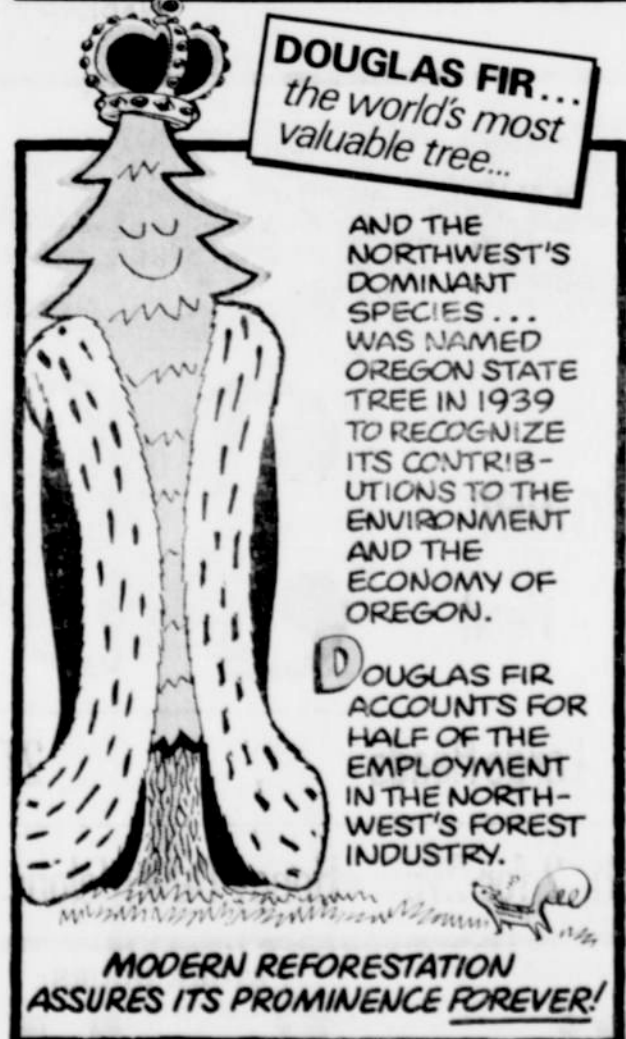


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
