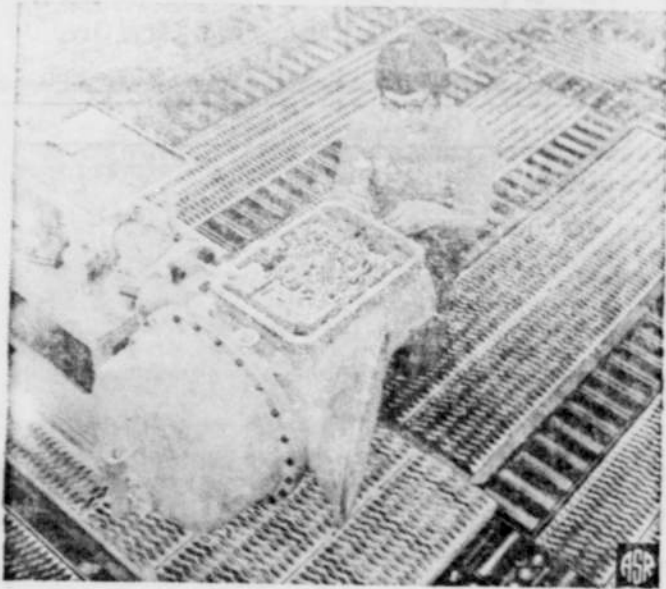


Reptile Show Held At Detroit

Assorted geometric shapes add an artistic touch to this manufacturing photo taken at Detroit Diesel Allison Division of General Motors in Indianapolis. Featured is one of the firm's new V-730 automatic transmissions for transit coaches. This transmission is the latest technological entry into the burgeoning mass transit industry and represents the first phase of a major expansion effort at the company. Each of the new three-speed automatics goes through a series of static and operational tests by technicians such as Charles L. Acton to verify quality and reliability before shipment to the coach manufacturer. Fluid flowing under pressure through the intricately carved channels of the valve body (in front of Acton) activates a series of valves. These in turn control the automatic-shifting components. Completing the picture are the roller conveyors and perforated walkways covering the production floor.

Hostesses will be Ruth Thomason, Carol Benton and Marcia Guerin. The Woman of the Year Award will be presented at the Christmas dinner.

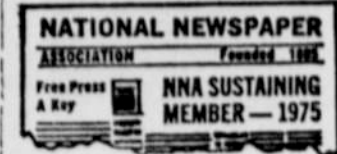
Maryellen Hancock announced that there is a fund for federal grants to help those with low incomes to make their homes warmer. Interested persons may contact her by calling 854-3351.
