The New York Post's Washington special says: Delta Lockwood threatens proceedings against the election officers who threw out 100 votes cast for her in New Hampshire, 200 in Chicago, several hundred in Michigan and 200 in California. She says these votes must appear in the official returns to the vice president or "I will know the reason why."

Congressman Tucker, recently elected from the fourth district of Virginia by the Democrats, has been appointed guardian for the minor children of the late President Garfield. His trust includes all the property owned by General Garfield in Virginia. Mrs. Garfield in making the request, referred to the kind relations which existed between Mr. Tucker and her husband.

The state canvassers of New York met at Albany at noon, Nov. 21. All were present. Secretary Wool announced the footings of the tables as follows: Highest democratic elector, Priest, 563,154; highest republican elector, Carson, 562,043; democratic plurality, 1,149. The lowest democratic elector, Ottendorfer, 508,043; lowest republican elector, Havard, 501,071; plurality, 1,072. Highest elector, elector, Miller, 25,006; lowest, Ellsworth, 24,948. Highest Butler elector, O'Donnell, 17,041; lowest, Campbell, 16,731. After the announcement the canvassers of the board signed the tables and certificates.

Wednesday evening, Nov. 19, Adolph, son of Clara Spreckles, entered the counting-room of the Chronicle, and immediately commenced a malicious attack upon M. H. DeYoung. His first three shots, a little struck DeYoung in the left arm, a little above the elbow, and the second one hit him in the shoulder. A clerk in the office named Emerson returned the fire, wounding Spreckles in the arm. Emerson and Spreckles were arrested, and DeYoung was taken home. His wounds are serious but are not considered dangerous. The cause was recent articles published in the Chronicle reflecting on the business methods of the Spreckles. The malicious assault bears a great similarity to that of five years ago, when Chas. DeYoung was foully assaulted by young Kallio. It is to be hoped that in the present instance the assault may not escape without some punishment. It is getting to be rather too frequent occurrence for a journalist to be shot by some cowardly scoundrel who gets the drop on him, and then tries to exonerate himself by saying he was assaulted through the news papers. If the pistol is to be the cause of the press, an editor ought at least be given an equal chance, and the code of honor revised once more.

The latest reports received at the headquarters of the congressional committee show that in the next house of representatives the democrats will have 183 members and the republicans 142, a democratic majority of 41. Already the question of the organization of the next house is being discussed. The protectionist democrats will have a much smaller minority in the forty-ninth congress than they have in the present congress. Of the 41 democrats who voted to strike out the exacting clause of the Morrison tariff bill, only nineteen of them will have seats in the next house. These are Arnot, Sprague and Muller, of New York; Boyce, Curtin, Danahy, Randall, Storm and Brewster of Pennsylvania; Finlay, of Maryland; Foss, Gables, LeFevre, Seely, Warner and Wilkins, of Ohio; Hunt, of Louisiana; McKelton, of New Jersey; and Snyder, of West Virginia. The general opinion is that the tariff question will come up again in the next congress. Confidently it is said, will certainly be spoken, and will, of course, put Morrison at the head of the ways and means committee. Randall, alone of the most prominent Democratic opponents of the Morrison bill, will be in the next congress. Morrison also loses two of his most able lieutenants in the persons of Ford and Donahoe.

A fearful epidemic is ravaging the western counties of Virginia. People are dying in scores, and in places there are hardly enough of the living to bury the dead. The country spoken of has been afflicted by a long drought, and wells and streams have gone dry, leaving the people no water to use except such as is gathered into deep ponds in creek and river beds. The use of this poisonous water is supposed to have caused the strange and fatal sickness now raging. A New York Sun Wheeling special says: A letter received from a representative of a lumbering firm buying timber in the extreme southern part of the state, and in the afflicted portions of Virginia, contains the worst reports sent out concerning the epidemic and death afflicting that region. Forest fires are frequent, and the villages of Perrinton are totally destroyed. The people would gladly leave but have no means. Relief committees are organizing in some of the larger villages. An appeal for food, clothing and medicine will soon be made. The Methodist minister at Gladesville, in the Cumberland mountains, buried his wife and two children, making their graves with his own hands. He said the simple burial service was the only comfort. Day and night he labored without ceasing, burying scores, acting as physician, preacher, school teacher, and gravedigger, and still refused to leave his field of labor. His name is Sen. Joseph Hannon, and he has a salary less than \$300 year.

COAST NOTES.

Los Angeles reports that her honey production for 1894 will amount to 10,000 tons, valued at \$100,000. Post Laporte is in charge of a non-commissioned officer and one private. It will not be garlanded again unless Indian troubles arise. A woman was elected justice of the peace in one of the precincts of King County, W. T.; another precinct reports a woman for constable.

Washington was the banner Butler county in Oregon in the late election, carrying 109 votes for Ben. and Multnomah the banner St. John county, with 62 votes for him. As an illustration of what Oregon can do in one of the precincts of the state, the city authorities have decided to transfer the soldiers who came from Vancouver and go on across in this city. It has been the custom heretofore to let them go free as soon as they became sober.—Portland Press.

The lady clerks at the polls in Tacoma became weary after twenty-four hours' service, and were compelled to take a rest for several hours during which time their duties were performed by men who were sworn in for the purpose.

Prominent planters in California are bringing negroes from the south to drive out Chinese labor. Cotton planting is proving successful in the state. An agent tells a New York reporter that he has orders for the colonization of 10,000 negroes in the state. The figures are no doubt exaggerated. The men are paid \$12 per month and board, the women \$8, and boys \$6.

F. A. Trille, governor of Arizona, in his annual report to the secretary of the interior, after referring to the prosperous condition of the territory, says: "The limited number of the land grants to the Atlantic and Pacific and Texas Pacific railroads before congress is preventing, to a great extent, the settlement of the territory." The governor says that unless the extensive immigration of Mexicans in the territory is restrained by law, he fears violence. He urges an appropriation for sinking artesian wells in the highest valleys of Arizona, which will render fertile hundreds of thousands of acres. The report also urges a geological survey by the government and the establishment of a branch mint. In conclusion, Governor Trille says that the time has arrived when the people of Arizona should be allowed to vote for the president of the United States, and that their delegate in congress should be permitted to vote and exercise the rights of representatives of states.
