**KATHERINE JANE K. WINKLEMAN**

WINKLEMAN—Near Lakeview, Oregon, March 17, 1901, Katherine Jane K. Winkleman, aged 81 years, 5 months and 5 days.

Deceased was a native of Alleghany county, Pennsylvania. She was born October 12, 1819. Her maiden name was Katherine Jane K. Farrior. She came to the Pacific Coast with her husband in 1853, and arrived in Lake county, Oregon, in 1874. For eleven years she resided in Summer Lake, this county, and the balance of the time, to the day of her death, on a little place a few miles north of Lakeview. Her husband died in San Francisco three years ago last July.

"Grandma" Winkleman was one of those good old souls who believed in being just to all mankind. She was eccentric in her way, and desired to live alone, and for years she lived so, apparently in the full enjoyment of life. She believed in living independently, and even in her old age was energetic and thrifty, planning for future prosperity. Time upon time, as old age came creeping on, she had been invited to share a pleasant home with her son George at Summer Lake, or with her son Lem in Warner, but she was persistent in her refusals, and would never accept their hospitality or claim the duty of her sons to care for her. She owned a small place a few miles from town and had accumulated a few hundred sheep, and seemed to live happily in caring for what little she had of this world's goods.

After a few weeks of illness death came to her in her ripe old age at 8 o'clock last Sunday night, while surrounding her deathbed were her three sons. "Grandma" Winkleman will be remembered by many old friends as a loveable and venerable woman, who lived a spotless life. She leaves to mourn her demise three sons and a daughter—George Winkleman of Summer Lake, Lem Winkleman of Warner, Lee Winkleman and Mrs. E. E. Wilcox of Madera county, California.

The funeral took place from the Methodist Episcopal Church in Lakeview at 2 p. m. Tuesday, and Rev. C. Wesley Raymond officiated. Many friends of the family showed their respect for the deceased and followed the remains to "God's half acre" in the Old Fellows' cemetery.
