### ELIZABETH LOFTUS.

Mrs. Elizabeth Loftus, familiarly called "Grandma" Loftus, died last Sunday night at 11 o'clock at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Frank E. Bauers, a few miles north of Lakeview. A few weeks ago deceased suffered a stroke of apoplexy, and, owing to her old age and weakened condition, she never rallied from the shock. Her death was peaceful, and the calm look upon her face after death denoted the fact that she was prepared to meet her God.

Elizabeth Loftus was born in Henry county, Missouri, and at the time of her death she was aged 70 years, 6 months and 6 days. She was married to Edw'd Henry Loftus at her old Missouri home in 1850, and in 1853 they started across the plains by ox team to seek their fortunes in the Wild West. She was a pioneer woman, who bore the hardships and perils of early days with fortitude and bravery. She, with many others, had narrow escapes from the warring Indians from the time she left Missouri and for some time after reaching the Pacific Coast. After reaching the West they settled in the Willamette valley, where Albany, Linn county, now stands, and there they lived for three years, removing then to Rogue River valley. After many years' residence on a farm there they moved to Ashland, where deceased owned a beautiful home at the time of her death. She came to Lakeview October 19, 1899, to spend some time with her sons and daughter, visiting alternately with each of them. Her husband died suddenly April 7, 1898, at Crane Lake, this county, while visiting his son, John W. Loftus. He dropped dead from heart disease while walking about the grounds. His age was 70 years and 2 days.

Deceased was a Christian woman and was as well prepared to solve the mysteries of the other world as any mortal could be. Everybody who had the pleasure of her acquaintance admired the aged woman for her gentleness and grace, and those who knew her intimately, and were counted among her friends, were aware of her kindly heart and loving disposition. She leaves behind her a legion of friends who will mourn her loss sincerely. Her children, all grown to man and womanhood, will miss the loving face from the fireside. Those children living are Mrs. Mary Bauers, Columbus C., E. H., J. W., and O. D. Loftus, all but the latter residing in this county.

The funeral was held Tuesday from the Baptist Church, Rev. C. W. Raymond officiating in place of Rev. C. H. Holloman, who was taken suddenly ill just before the funeral. Many friends and acquaintances of the family attended to show their respect, and to perform the last sad duty to the dead.
