Lakeview is once more preparing to grow this summer. The town is going to begin where it felt off when the snow began to fly, and will not stop until there is not a vacant business lot in the town. Now, if the cottage builder would only show himself—take up some of his rusty gold and invest it in dwelling places for the people who are willing to pay him good rents—we would all rise up and call him blest. People want to live in our live town and they want houses to live in. We wonder how long it will take some of our local capitalists to figure out that the building of fifty cottages for rent is the best investment to be found in Lake county.

The loans of the common school fund of the State of Oregon have been increased \$81,000. The total amount of loans outstanding January 1, 1901 was \$2,060,623.32. Since that time many payments have been made, and new loans placed, but the loans exceeded the payments sufficiently to bring the total up to \$2,172,270.27. All loans are made at 6 per cent, and the interest constitutes the common school fund, which is appropriated annually among the schools of the state. The more loans the board is able to make the greater will be the amount of interest to divide among the common schools, hence the increase is noted with approval. The common school funds loaned in Lake county amount to \$14,200.50.

The Races—\$1,000 Purses.

The program of the races, to be held in Lakeview from the 2d to the 6th of July, under the auspices of the Lake County Agricultural Association, will be found in this issue of The Examiner. There should be a big meeting here this season, as the one in 1899 was very successful, and at that time but \$800 in purses were offered. This season the purses will amount to \$1,100, which will be an inducement for numerous horsemen from a distance to come here and enter their animals in the contests. Besides the four days racing there will be a baseball tournament for purses aggregating \$200, which will no doubt bring several outside teams here on that occasion, as the conditions are that two or more teams must enter from outside of Goose Lake valley.

Miller & Lux Retire.

Information from a thoroughly reliable source has come into the possession of The Examiner to the effect that on April 4, 1901, Miller & Lux, the big cattle dealers, leased to J. W. Howard, the cattleman of the Deschutes, the Lane and Flaron ranches at Silver Lake and Sican, this county, held under lease by Miller & Lux. The leases will hold until January 1, 1904. It was the intention of Miller & Lux to restock the Silver Lake ranches, held by them, during the coming spring, but as Mr. Howard offered to take the leases off their hands at the original cost, a deal was effected whereby the lands passed into the hands of the Deschutes man. This makes final the retirement of Miller & Lux from the Silver Lake section of Lake county.
