## JULY RACES

The Lake County Agricultural Association will give four days racing on their track in Lakeview, commencing July 2d, and ending July 6, 1901. The sum of \$1,100 will be distributed in purses as follows:

**FIRST DAY—JULY 2d.**  
First Race, 3-8-mile dash ..... \$125  
(Two-year-olds)  
Second Race, free for all, 3-8 and repeat... \$125

**SECOND DAY—JULY 3d.**  
First Race, free for all, 3-4 dash..... \$100  
Second Race, free for all, 1-mile dash..... \$125

**THIRD DAY—JULY 5th.**  
First Race, free for all, 1-1/4 mile dash... \$150  
Second Race, free for all, 5/8 mile dash... \$125

**FOURTH DAY—JULY 6th.**  
First Race, free for all, 1-2 mile heats... \$150  
Second Race, Vaquero horses, 600 yards... \$ 50  
(For Lake County)

Third Race ..... Handicap  
Distance and weights to be announced July 4th, to suit horses and attendants.

**CONDITIONS.**  
All of the above races are free for all, except saddle race, which is for Lake county horses. Four to enter and three to start, but the Association reserves the right to hold a less number than four to fill by reducing the purse in proportion to the number of horses entered.  
Entries to close the evening before the race. The Pacific Coast Blood Horse Association rules to govern all running races. Entrance fee ten per cent (10) of purse. Money to be divided as follows: 70 per cent to the first horse and 30 per cent to second horse.  
The Association reserves the right to change any of the above races, in the event of not filling, or to change the date of the last day's event to the following day in case any other attachment is announced for that date. No money paid without a contest.  
Entries for the saddle race to be made before a committee composed of Jack Muirkey, Harry Roberts, Gus Schroeder, J. N. Givan and Chas Trumbo.
