The Lakeview Examiner reports that the wool crop in that county is said to be heavy this season. With the sheep in Lake county numbering 100,000, the wool crop will, indeed, be heavy. There is wool enough in that county alone to justify the building of a large woolen mill at Klamath Falls, thereby making a first class market for the wool in Lake county, as also for that produced in Crook and Klamath counties.
