ABOUT HOGS.

Hogs, the Four-footed Kind, Cannot Legally Run at Large in Lake.

PAISLEY, OR., May 3, 1901.
EDITOR EXAMINER: Please answer this question through the columns of The Examiner:

"Can hogs legally run at large in Lake county, Oregon?" RANCHER.

"Rancher" does not say whether he means two-legged or four-legged hogs. We believe the statute does not touch the former, but of the genuine quadruped swine, the statute of 1882, Hill's Annotated Laws of Oregon, section 3413, says:

"The owner or keeper of any swine shall not allow the same to run or be at large, out of his own inclosure, in the counties of Polk, Lake, Multnomah, Washington, Yamhill and Marion, and that part of Linn county south of the South Santiam River * * * under penalty of ten dollars for the first offense and of twenty-five dollars for each and every subsequent offense, to be recovered by civil action, in the name of the State of Oregon, before a Justice of the Peace of the precinct in which such owner or keeper, or either of them, may reside; and such penalty shall be for the benefit of, and when collected paid into, the common school fund of the county in which such action is brought, within sixty days after such animal is proved to be at large."

This section of the law has never been repealed.
