Most all the boys from the country were in town last Friday to take in the show and dance given by the Paisley Dramatic Club. All were well pleased with their entertainment.

The Lakeview base ball boys have received a new outfit. They expect to outshine the visiting teams on their diamond on the Fourth of July. That \$200 will buy a handsome outfit for the Paisley-Silver Lake team, and next Fourth we will shine.

Hanan & Goldhaggin of Roseburg, Or., have leased a big tract of land in the Klamath Reservation for a term of years and will stock it up with 1000 head of cattle this spring. Mr. Hanan is a brother of J. C. Hanan of this place. These gentlemen have been in the beef buying business, buying and selling for several years, and have decided to raise some cattle.

The horse is a fine colt four years old and at the present will weigh about 1200 pounds, the sire weighing 2000 and the dam 1700. The colt is as near perfect as one generally sees. Mr. Currier has some well-bred Connor mares from which he expects to raise some good horses.

"BORING" FOR OIL.

The Examiner is in receipt of a letter from a prominent man of Modoc county, who desires to know if our people want to prospect for oil in this county and form a company for the purpose, as he had noticed in The Examiner frequent allusions to oil. The gentleman says he found oil many years ago and is well posted on the formations, localities, croppings, paraffins, asphaltum, etc. The Examiner is not prepared to say whether there really exist any indications of oil in the county, but it is said that some years ago a gentleman announced that he had found good indications of oil somewhere on the desert in this county.

Upon this flimsy foundation we do not believe our people would care to organize a company and capitalize it for the purpose of searching out the locality where the indications are "said to have been found." However, we do not believe our people would object to some energetic "oil expert" coming into this territory to look for the "burning stuff" and after he had found it, or at least good indications of it, they would probably not object to taking up the matter of boring, and furnishing the "kaleseed" to prosecute the work.

LAST SAD RITES

Additional Particulars of the Death and Burial of H. Bloomingcamp.

The Yreka Journal gives further particulars of the death and burial of Henry Bloomingcamp, killed last week at Bly, as follows:

"Henry Bloomingcamp, oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Bloomingcamp of Bogus, this county, aged 38 years, was accidentally killed at Sprague River, Oregon, last Monday, while engaged with others in building a joint ditch. Three blasts were set off and the men took refuge behind a tree, when a large rock blown up, came down upon Henry crushing his head in a frightful manner, causing instant death. The remains were embalmed and hermetically sealed in a casket at Klamath Falls, Or., as required by law in shipping to this State by rail, although the remains were brought all the way by wagon, arriving at Bogus Wednesday last and in Yreka yesterday morning about 8 o'clock. Henry was the owner of a fine ranch on Sprague River, in partnership with his brother Fred, possessing the largest barn in Lake county and over 800 cattle. They also own two other stock ranches in Oregon. The deceased was a native of Yreka, his parents having been residents of this place during the '60 period. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon from Red Men's Hall in Yreka, and was largely attended by the friends and acquaintances of the afflicted family in Bogus, Yreka, and other sections of the county, who sincerely sympathize with the bereaved father, mother, sisters and brothers in their sad and untimely loss of an exemplary young man. The services at the funeral were conducted by Rev. J. E. Wright of the M. E. Church, and the body was laid to rest in Evergreen Cemetery."

JULY RACES

The Lake County Agricultural Association will give four days racing on their track in Lakeview, commencing July 21, and ending July 6, 1901. The sum of \$1,100 will be distributed in purses as follows:

FIRST DAY—JULY 21.
First Race, 3/8-mile dash (Two-year-olds) \$125
Second Race, free for all, 3/8 and repeat \$125

SECOND DAY—JULY 22.
First Race, free for all, 1/4 dash \$100
Second Race, free for all, 1-mile dash \$125

THIRD DAY—JULY 23.
First Race, free for all, 1 1/4 mile dash \$150
Second Race, free for all, 3/8 mile dash \$125

FOURTH DAY—JULY 24.
First Race, free for all, 1-2 mile heats \$150
Second Race, Vagueros horses, 600 yards \$50 (For Lake County)

Third Race Handicap Distance and weights to be announced July 24, to suit horses and attendants.


CONDITIONS.
All of the above races are free for all, except saddle race, which is for Lake county horses. Four to enter and three to start; but the Association reserves the right to hold a less number than four to fill by reducing the purse in proportion to the number of horses entered.
Entries to close the evening before the race. The Pacific Coast Blood Horse Association rules to govern all running races. Entrance fee ten per cent (10) of purse. Money to be divided as follows: 70 per cent to the first horse and 30 per cent to second horse.
The Association reserves the right to change any of the above races, in the event of no filling or to change the date of the last day's event to the following day in case any other amusement is announced for that date. No money paid without a contest.
