Tracy Blair, formerly of Lake county, writes to his father Assessor John Blair, from Silver Lake, Montana, from which The Examiner is privileged to take a few excerpts. Mr. Blair is with a surveying crew for the Butte, Anaconda & Pacific Railway Co. He says: "We are located at a place called Silver Lake, but there is quite a contrast between Silver Lake, Montana and Silver Lake, Oregon. This place is 6872 feet above sea level, and it snows here about 365 days in the year. It is snowing today (April 26th) as I write. We have been here three months, but expect to be ordered out soon to be put on flume construction at Anaconda—the same kind of survey work we are doing now. We are making a reservoir out of Silver Lake and surveying five miles for a flume to bring water from Twin Creeks to store in the lake. Water never goes to waste here; it is all used in the mills and smelters, and afterward utilized. All these industries are under different names, but come under one head proper—the Standard Oil Company. This is a fine job; we are on the move all the time."
