LAKEVIEW, OREGON, May 23, 1901. COURT convened pursuant to adjournment May 22, 1901, at which were present J. M. Martin, Commissioner, S. J. Prose, Commissioner, H. R. Dunlap, Sheriff, and Wm. Gunther, Clerk when the following proceedings were had, to wit:

In the matter of the assessment of B. Daly, for the year 1900:

This matter coming on to be heard upon the application of the above named B. Daly to compromise and settle the matter of certain taxes irregularly and wrongfully assessed and charged to him upon the assessment roll of Lake County, Oregon, for the year 1900, and upon examination of the assessment roll for said year, and of the records of this county of the title to certain lands owned by said B. Daly, it satisfactorily appearing to the court that the land described on lines 10, 13 and 15 at page 98 of said assessment roll are wrongfully described thereon and that the taxes charged to said B. Daly against said lands are wrongfully and irregularly assessed and charged to him, and in order to compromise the controversy arising therefrom, and to prevent a sale of said lands for said taxes at Sheriff's sale, thereby creating a cloud upon his title to the same, the said B. Daly appearing in person before this Court and offering a part thereof, to-wit: The sum of \$20, upon the condition that the sheriff of said county shall be by this court directed to give said B. Daly credit upon the said assessment roll for the said sum of \$20, as well as the entire balance remaining unpaid the con, and the court having fully considered the same and being fully advised in the premises, accepts and agrees to the terms of compromise as above set forth.

It is therefore ordered that the Sheriff of this county, upon the payment of the said sum of \$20 to him of said taxes by said B. Daly, be and he is hereby directed to cancel and mark the same, upon the margin of said assessment roll, satisfied and paid in full, by noting the amount so paid, and referring to this order; it is further ordered that said Sheriff credit himself for said unpaid balance remitted by this order.

The District Attorney is hereby authorized to take such steps as he may deem necessary for the collection of the amount due upon the Tax Collector bond heretofore given by A. J. Neilon.

The District Attorney is hereby authorized to employ the services of an expert for the purpose of farther expediting the accounts of A. J. Neilon as tax collector.

Ordered by the court that warrants be drawn upon the Treasurer in payment of the following allowed claims, to-wit: J. M. Martin, Commissioner's salary 2 days \$8.00 S. J. Prose, " " " " " " 8.50 Court adjourned for the term.

It is not the intention to bore for artesian, but to go down about 100 feet for pure water. However, Mr Waller would not be surprised to strike a flowing well in Chewaucan. He says he is satisfied artesian water can be found in Goose Lake valley.

D. F. Fox, Deputy U. S. Revenue Collector for this district, spent several days here last week looking after the interest of the government. Under a new law to take effect in July, merchants and saloon men are to receive a rebate on the tax on tobacco and cigars. The merchants carrying 400 pounds of tobacco and the saloon men carrying 16,000 cigars entitled to rebate. Mr. Fox found four or five merchants in Lakeview carrying the necessary amount of tobacco to come under the rebate tax head.
