### Pendleton Market.

So far as the wool situation in Pendleton, this state, is concerned, there would seem to be nothing of an encouraging nature to offer. The wool market is looked upon as stagnant, with but small hope of improvement in the near future. The history of the past years is filled with discouragements. At the time of the February flurry offers of 15 cents a pound were made, and some of the sheepmen parted with their holdings at that figure. Others among them became headstrong and refused to sell. The advance in price was of short duration, and the continued depression ensued that has left most of the wool in the warehouses.

Some sales are reported at 10 cents and some at an advance of half a cent. But there is scarcely any wool moving. It can safely be said that nobody is selling wool at 10 cents a pound, who can afford to hold it. That some growers will be forced to part with their wool of last season's clip is a foregone conclusion. Many of them received advances from the banks that ran as high as 7 cents a pound. They are paying interest on this money as well as warehouse charges, and they cannot stand the pressure very much longer. The banks are beginning to insist on a sale of some kind, as they deem their security somewhat involved.
