Eighteen Hundred Cattle.

John Roach of South Dakota, on May 26th sold 10,000 head of 2-year-old steers, which he purchased from Brown & Profit of Baker City, to W. W. Coburn of Great Falls, Minnesota. This lot of cattle was sent out on the 30th ult. to Baltic, Mont., where they will be delivered to the purchaser to be turned on the range. Roach also purchased 800 head of 2-year-olds at Huntington, which will be shipped to his ranch in South Dakota, where they will be turned on the range and put in condition for the Chicago market.

Twelve Thousand Cattle.

A large sale of beef was to be consummated in Malheur County June 19th. That is the date fixed for the delivery to one Eastern firm of between 10,000 and 12,000 head of yearlings and 2-year-olds. All this stock is intended for the Eastern market. Yearlings are purchased by these buyers for \$20, and 2-year-olds \$27. This price is \$1 cheaper than the same stock sold for at the same period last year. The sale will clean up most of the surplus beef in that section of the country and will leave few for the Fall market.

Caldwell (Idaho) News: Several large clips of wool have been sold during the past week, at prices ranging from 10 to 11 1/2 cents. That sold for 11 1/2 cents was the large clip of Drennan & Canter, and the price is the highest of any clip sold during this season at any point along the Short Line.
