

SOME 'PUNKINS.'

They Can Talk About Their 'Taters In Hawaii and Their Corn in Illinois, But They Can't Touch Goose Lake Valley For Strawberries.

An exchange says that, "According to Gov. Dodge's report to the agricultural department as to the productiveness of Hawaiian soil, a farmer in Maui planted a potato and used the hole it grew in for a cellar. But that is nothing to Illinois' soil. A man in McHenry county raised a crop of broom corn that got so tall it kept the clouds swept out of the sky all last summer, while down on John Gillette's farm at Elkville the corn is so tall already that three children have broken their necks by falling out of the stalks while looking for eagles' nests. John has been forced to get a patient on a machine he calls the Solar Corn Harvester and Child Protector. It is filled with gas, like a balloon, and the operator leans out of it and cuts the ears off with a scythe, carefully removing any children that may be in the way and depositing them on the molar side of a parachute."

That is very good corn and fairly good potato, probably a trifle higher and larger than can be grown in Lake county; but they can't touch us in Hawaii or Illinois for berries. A Goose Lake farmer last season very foolishly planted a strawberry patch within forty-two feet of his residence, and neglecting to look at the patch before retiring one night, imagine his astonishment when he awoke next morning to find his house moved from its foundation, and still moving at the rate of six inches per hour—the ripening berries crushing against the building with such force as to push it out of the way to make room for them to grow. Of course the berries had to be picked at once to keep the residence on the farm. They were "crushed strawberries."

The Benefits of a Creamery.

To show the community benefits to be derived from creameries, we reprint the following dispatch to the Oregonian from Coquille City, under date of May 26th: "A careful estimate of the product of the creameries on the Coquille river, not including the butter and cheese turned out by factories at Gravelly, Fairview, Lee and Sumner, is as follows:

The amount of butter made per day is 2000 pounds. To make this takes about 80,000 pounds of milk, there are also made about 800 pounds cheese, for which is required about 9 pounds of milk. This means a daily product of 60,000 pounds of butter and 21,000 pounds of cheese, requiring for a thirty days' run a total of 655,000 pounds of milk. As this butter and cheese will average about 15 cents a pound, the average income to the farmers and dairymen of the Coquille river alone is about \$12,000 per month. The larger creameries start up in April and run until December, and sometimes through January."

Will Be "Vigorously Urged."

Among the barrels of literature being sent out by Secretary and Traffic Manager J. C. Leary, of the American Cattle Growers' Association, is a letter which among other things contains the following paragraph: "Cattlemen generally favor a just and equitable plan for the leasing of the public domain. A bill providing for such leaseholds is now being prepared by this association which will be presented and vigorously urged for passage at the next session of congress. It will be favorably received if cowmen generally support it. Does it meet with your approval?" The Examiner does not believe there is a single "cowman" in Lake county, outside of big corporations, that will support such a measure. It is a proposition with the object in view of crushing the small cattlemen and sheepmen.

The Lake County Agricultural Association will give four days racing on their track in Lakeview, commencing July 2d, and ending July 6, 1901. The sum of \$1,100 will be distributed in purses as follows:

FIRST DAY—JULY 2d.

First Race, 3 ½-mile dash \$125 (Two year-olds)

Second Race, free for all, 3 ½ and repeat \$125

SECOND DAY—JULY 3d.

First Race, free for all, 3 ¼ dash \$100

Second Race, free for all, 1-mile dash \$125

THIRD DAY—JULY 5th.

First Race, free for all, 1 ½-mile dash \$150

Second Race, free for all, 5 ½-mile dash \$150

FOURTH DAY—JULY 6th.

First Race, free for all, 1 ½-mile heats \$150

Second Race, Vaquero horses, 600 yards \$50

(For Lake County)

Third Race Handicap Distance and weights to be announced July 4th, to suit horses and attendants.

CONDITIONS.

All of the above races are free for all, except saddle race, which is for Lakeview horses only, but the Association reserves the right to hold a less number four to fit by reducing the purse in proportion to the number of horses entered.

Entries to close the evening before the race.

The Pacific Coast Blood Horse Association rules to govern all running races. Entrance fee ten percent (10%) of purse. Money to be divided as follows: 70 per cent to the first horse and 20 per cent to second horse.

The Association reserves the right to change any of the above races, in the event of not fitting, or to change the date of the last day's event to the following day in case any other amusement is announced for that date. No money paid without a contest.
