ATTORNEY'S OPINIONS

Assistant Attorney General Post of California Expresses Himself in Regard to the Flood Lynchers.

Assistant Attorney-General C. N. Post, of California, who went to Alturas to assist the district attorney in presenting evidence to the grand jury in connection with the lynching of Calvin Hall, his sons, and Dan Yantis, at Lookout, has returned to Sacramento.

Judge Post informed the Sacramento Bee that while twelve or thirteen men constituted the mob which did the lynching, the evidence adduced in the course of the examination of fifty-one witnesses was sufficient to warrant the Grand Jury in indicting but three of them.

These men are James W. Brown, the deputy constable, who, with a man named Goyett, were in charge of the prisoners when they were captured by the mob; Isom Eades and Robert E. Leventon, who, with his brother, conducts a blacksmith shop at Lookout.

Judge Post, in reviewing the case, stated that nothing had developed to show that Calvin Hall had been guilty of the offenses charged against him.

On the night of the tragedy, Hall was in custody without due process of law, Judge Post said.

He had been arrested on a charge of petty larceny, but was released two days before the tragedy on his own recognizance. Judge Post says that there is no doubt that Hall's arrest without warrant was part of the conspiracy to lynch him.

The mob was partly armed with wagon spokes, and these were obtained from Leventon's blacksmith shop, Judge Post stated.

500 Horses Wanted.

A. F. Rooker, horse buyer for the government, telegraphs from San Francisco to W. Z. Moss that he wants 500 horses in Lake county suitable for cavalry purposes. The animals must be 15 hands, 1 inch, or over. Mr. Rooker wants 500 horses in a hurry. He will arrive here July 10th. Horsemen will please take notice.

Accidentally Killed.

A dispatch to The Examiner from Cedarville, Modoc county, under date of June 29th, gives the information that Henry Perry was accidentally killed near Eagleville on the 28th ult. by falling beneath the wheels of his wagon while teaming near that place.

Herman F. Ross, one of the early pioneers of Shasta county, Cal., and for over a quarter of a century a resident of Millville, was thrown from his buggy last week and received injuries from which he died six hours later.

F. O. Bunting, breeder of thoroughbred Hereford cattle, will have on exhibition at his corral today, Main Street, just south of J. S. Field's store, five yearling registered Hereford bulls. Mr. Bunting invites the public to call and see these animals. A special invitation is extended to all the stockmen of Lake county who may be here.

U. S. Indian Inspector McLaughlin was here and at Klamath Agency a few days ago and while at the Agency in council with the Indians completed the treaty with them to cede to the United States the strip of 600,000 acres adjoining the reservation. Of this 600,000 acres 300,000 acres are covered by good yellow and sugar pine.—Klamath Republican.

The sum of \$3000 has already been paid to the attorneys for Leventon, Brown and Eades, charged with the murder of the Halls and Yantis at Lookout. Judge Harris has received \$1,500 as a retainer, it is said, and Spencer & Raker \$1,500 as counsel. The attorneys will receive a like sum as the case progresses, making \$6,000 in total for the defense. It is said the accused do not fear the result of a trial.

Dr. Schmidt of San Francisco has established a sanitarium at Amedee, the one-time terminus of the N-C-O railroad. A park will be laid out and boats put on Honey lake for the pleasure of Sanitarium guests.
