The "hot wave" continues in the suffering East. After all, the only comfortable place, Winter and Summer, is the Pacific Coast.

Judge H. L. Benson has the following to say in the Oregonian about the railroad prospects for Klamath Falls: "I understand that there is a party of surveyors in the field, headed for Klamath Falls from Hornbrook or some point on the Southern Pacific, and rumor has it that President Hayes, of the Southern Pacific, is at the back of the movement. If this is the case, we will have a road, as that corporation has the means to go ahead, and in all probability the directors have heard of the big, rich territory to be tapped in Klamath, Lake and Harney counties."

Hood River's most successful strawberry season has practically closed, and the total shipments of berries will foot up close to 40,000 crates, as compared to 25,000 last year. Although the season was backward, and the weather conditions unfavorable to the production of anywhere near a full crop, the berries produced were of good quality and market returns to the grower were never better. This year's crop has netted the Hood River farmers \$75,000 in hard cash, and there is hardly an acre in the valley planted to strawberries that has not netted the owner from \$100 to \$400.

The President has signed the commission of William H. Taft of Ohio as Civil Governor of the Philippine Islands.

Judge Taft was notified some time ago, when instructions were sent him relative to the inauguration of civil government in the islands July 4th, that he would be appointed Civil Governor. While the appointment of the Civil Governor is credited to the War Department this does not mean necessarily that the President is proceeding entirely under his war power in setting up civil government in the Philippines. He is not differentiating the source of his authority. He is acting, so it is universally stated, under all the powers he has in the premises.

George M. Miller, who has recently achieved much notoriety by hauling down the British flag near Skagway, is well known in Oregon, having resided in this state many years.
