The "Lot wave" continues in the suffering East. After all, the only comfortable place, Winter and Summer, is the Pacific Coast.

Judge H. L. Benson has the following to say in the Oregonian about the railroad prospects for Klamath Falls: "I understand that there is a party of surveyors in the field, headed for Klamath Falls from Hornbrook or some point on the Southern Pacific, and rumor has it that President Hays, of the Southern Pacific, is at the back of the movement. If this is the case, we will have a road, as that corporation has the means to go ahead, and in all probability the directors have heard of the big, rich territory to be tapped in Klamath, Lake and Harney counties."

Hood River's most successful strawberry season has practically closed, and the total shipments of berries will foot up close to 40,000 crates, as compared to 28,000 last year. Although the season was backward, and the weather conditions unfavorable to the production of anywhere near a full crop, the berries produced were of good quality and market returns to the grower were never better. This year's crop has netted the Hood River farmers \$75,000 in hard cash, and there is hardly an acre in the valley planted to strawberries that has not netted the owner from \$100 to \$400.

The President has signed the commission of William H. Taft of Ohio as Civil Governor of the Philippine islands. Judge Taft was notified some time ago, when instructions were sent him relative to the inauguration of civil government in the islands July 4th, that he would be appointed Civil Governor. While the appointment of the Civil Governor is credited to the War Department this does not mean necessarily that the President is proceeding entirely under his war power in setting up civil government in the Philippines. He is not differentiating the source of his authority. He is acting, so it is universally stated, under all the powers he has in the premises.

George M. Miller, who has recently achieved much notoriety by hauling down the British flag near Skagway, is well known in Oregon, having resided in this state many years. He is an attorney-at-law at Eugene, and for several years has been engaged in the real estate business, with varying success. He is a brother of Joaquin Miller, the "Poet of the Sierras." By those who know him, Mr. Miller is recognized as a remarkably bright man, but of decidedly erratic disposition. Four years ago, during the Klondike, he made a machine designed to melt the snow between Skagway and Dawson, and leave a clear path to seekers after gold. This machine was illustrated in The Oregonian by Joe Carl, who made many people laugh. Mr. Miller's wife is Mrs. Lichen M. Miller, the well known newspaper writer.

It was a matter for national felicitation, fourth of July week that the fiscal year which closed June 30 was the greatest business year in the history of the country. The official government records show that during the past twelve months the United States has enjoyed a foreign trade, counting both exports and imports, of \$2,335,000,000. These figures exceed by \$90,000,000 the stupendous figures of the preceding year. This means a balance of trade in favor of the United States of \$95,000,000 as against \$45,000,000 for the preceding fiscal year. The treasury officials also closed their books June 30 with the greatest surplus they have had at the end of any fiscal year since 1880. The surplus amounts to \$70,000,000 and the treasury now has in its vault nearly \$500,000,000 of gold, or an amount larger than that possessed by any other nation. Another indication of the national prosperity is to be found in the per capita circulation which is now the largest in the country's history, \$28.13.
