

COUNTY COURT Business Transacted at the July Term.

Continued From Last Week. In the matter of the report of W. D. Tracy, A. T. Clippinger and Isaac Deter, road viewers appointed to view, survey and lay out the road petitioned for by C. A. Branch and others, being read for the second time, this 6th day of July, 1901, and complaint having been filed by S. B. Chandler for damages, in the sum of \$60, and also a complaint filed by W. B. Hartman in the sum of \$500 for damages; it is therefore ordered that F. M. Duke, J. W. Mikel and A. S. Down be, and they are hereby appointed, to view said proposed road through the premises of the above-named complainants, and assess and determine the damages they are entitled to, and report the same in writing to this court at its next regular meeting.

Our apology for reproducing the few lines to follow is—the author lives in this town; and, further, because we consider the verses worth perusal. Here they are:

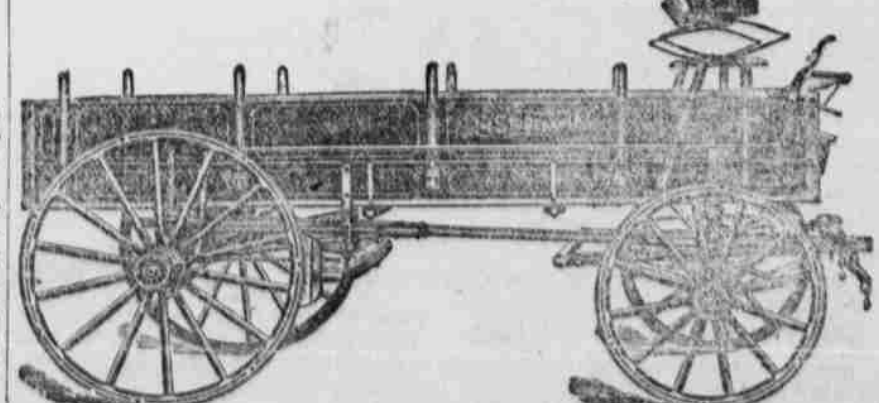
