WYOMING WOOLMEN

President Springer's Optimistic View of the Livestock Industry--Bill to Protect Woolgrowers.

The session of the Eastern Wyoming Woolgrowers' convention on July 11th was occupied with addresses by Governor Richards President Springer, of the National Livestock Association, Professors Foster and Nelson, of the Wyoming University, Secretary Snow, of the State Board of Sheep Commissioners, Hon. B. B. Brooks, Hon. C. W. Burdick and others.

President Springer took an optimistic view of the livestock industry, which was never in a more prosperous condition than now. He urged the election of members to Congress who will be favorable to the greatest of all industries, the growing of livestock. He said that Secretary of Agriculture Wilson had acceded to the wish of the association and would maintain a livestock statistical bureau, statistics to be gathered semi-annually. He also said that the association would urge the passage of a bill at the next session of Congress compelling manufacturers to tag all clothing so as to show the percentage of shabby material.

Governor Richards showed that it is not only possible to run sheep and cattle together, but it is also more profitable than conducting the two industries separately. He said that the idea that sheep ruin a range is a mistake and that many instances where sheep grazing had improved the range 50 per cent.

AMERICAN CAPTIVES.

Americans Who Fought With Boers and Were Captured by British Will Not be Restored.

Americans, who held in the four armistice since have been made prisoners by the British, will have to endure their captivity until the close of the South African War, says the Herald's Washington correspondent. Great Britain has declined to comply with the request of this Government to release an American now confined in the Island of Ceylon, and this refusal will probably prove a bar to further representations by the State Department in behalf of Americans captured as belligerents in South Africa.

The test case was that of a naturalized American named Morgan, who claims residence in Virginia. Lord Milner, the British High Commissioner in South Africa, disapproves of the release of foreigners who fought with the Boers. He has announced that a person who serves as a belligerent with the Boer force, loses his nationality and must be treated as an enemy. This view is concurred in by the legal officers of the State Department. The Department is satisfied from investigation made by American Consuls and the British authorities that all reports that the British are liberating their prisoners are without foundation. The only hardship that Americans captured in South Africa will have to undergo will be that of confinement until hostilities cease.
