

TO REMIT FINE. Klamath Man Wants To Be Excused.

Gov. T. T. Geer received a petition for the remission of a fine of \$300 imposed upon J. H. Harbin, convicted in Klamath county of the crime of selling liquor without a license. The request is made by Circuit Judge H. L. Benson, who tried the case; A. E. Reames, District Attorney, and the county judge and the commissioners of Klamath county. Judge Benson, in his letter, says:

"On June 10th J. H. Harbin pleaded 'guilty' in my court to a charge of selling liquor without a license, on an information filed the preceding November. There were two mis-trials in the November term, and when the matter came up again in the June term, by the withdrawal of the former plea and entering a plea of 'guilty,' he saved the county considerable expense. I had been approached in November by the county commissioners to dismiss the proceedings, but told them the man should be convicted, or plead guilty before I would do anything, and now, he having taken out his license after the November term, I wish to ask that his fine of \$300 be remitted. He is a cripple represented by the county commissioners to be a poor man and likely any day to become a charge on the county.

"While I seldom ask for a pardon or remission, in this instance I believe it is proper, and this action was contemplated by Mr. Harbin when he pleaded 'guilty,' and when I imposed sentence."

Cattle to Come Down.

Hank Putman, a cattle buyer well known to Grant county cattle growers, arrived in town early this week accompanied by his wife, says the Canyon City Eagle. Mr. Putman is buying beef cattle for Frye, Bruhn & Co., of Seattle, and is here looking out prospective purchases. He reports cattle higher here in Grant county than prices in the east will warrant, having just received a telegram from his company not to buy any more beef until further orders, as beef would be cheaper in a short time.

Mr. Putman states that the drought in Kansas and all neighboring states in that part of the Mississippi valley, has made it impossible to feed the number of cattle in that locality this fall as in former years, and would result in the price of beef falling several dollars per head. However, at present, Grant county cattle growers are not uneasy over the market and are constantly turning off their beef and stock cattle for the highest prices.

Will Play Ball.

It has been definitely settled that the Lakeview base ball team will go to Cedarville on the 15th inst. and cross bats with the crack nine of the pretty little village of Surprise valley. It has also been definitely settled that the Lakeview team will bring back the \$200 purse that the Cedarville people have so generously hung up.

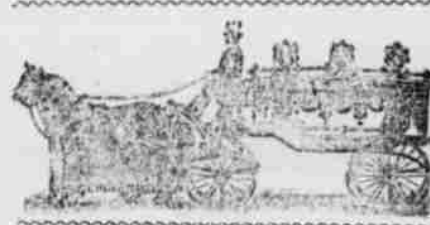
