"HELLO!" LINE

Expert Electrician Arrives to Put Up the Telephone Line From Lakeview to Silver Lake —To Rush the Work

William Harvey, President of the Lake County Telep. & Teleg. Co., returned last Sunday from San Francisco, whither he went two weeks ago to purchase tools for construction and all equipments for the line from Lakeview to Silver Lake.
Mr. Harvey was accompanied to Lakeview by O. T. Kimmel, an expert electrician, who was recommended to him by the Capital Telephone Co. of Sacramento. Mr. Kimmel thoroughly understands his business and will have full charge of the construction work, which will be commenced in a few days, just as soon as the material and the tools can be brought here from Terro, where they are awaiting transportation. The work will be started by Mr. Kimmel and twelve men, and the force will be increased as construction progresses. One of the directors will be on hand to see that the labor does not lag. The directors, in calling for labor, desire all the experienced line men they can engage. The construction will begin at Lakeview and proceed north as rapidly as possible. It is believed that before the first fall of snow the line will be completed and in working order to Silver Lake. Thus far the directors have not made a bauble in the preliminary work, which speaks well for their ability as business men, though inexperienced in the building of electrical lines. They have figured every expense down to a fine point, and have not expended a dollar unnecessarily. The line will run through Crooked Creek valley and through Chewaucan valley near the marsh.

It is desired that twelve men who understand something about such work will apply at once to V. L. Snelling, Secretary of the Company at the H. C. Rothe & Co. store in Lakeview. Mr. Kimmel will arrange a telephone on the line as it builds on so that he can communicate with Lakeview at any time.

SARAH LYON.

Brief mention was made in The Examiner last week of the death of Mrs. B. B. Lyon of Willow Ranch. Deceased had been a patient sufferer for many months, and all that the best medical skill could accomplish was of no avail, and the good mother, loving wife and kind friend passed out of life, leaving many mourners to deeply regret her loss.

Her maiden name was Sarah Follett, born in Beetown, Wisconsin, Dec. 3, 1841. She was married to C. M. Grant in the east July 3, 1864 and one child, Elza Grant, was the result of this union. On Sept. 1, 1871, deceased was joined in marriage with Bradley B. Lyon, the husband who is now painfully bereaved by her death. Four children were left to the father's care—Milton C., Elmer E., Luther A. and Blanche E. Creede. The death occurred at the home near Willow Ranch on Aug. 28, 1901. The funeral was held at New Pine Creek on the 29th inst. and was quite largely attended. Deceased was the aunt of G. A. and Ashley Follett of Lakeview and Mrs. F. B. Houston of Adel, and sister to O. D. Follett of Lakeview.

Town Well Caved In.

The town well, from which water is supposed to be furnished to supply the engine to run the electric light dynamo, and incidentally for fire purposes, met with a sad mishap last Saturday night. Workmen have been engaged for several weeks in tunneling south from the bed of the well in search of more water, and only last week found a good sized flow that looked like a permanent one. On Saturday, however, the ground caved in and filled up the well, and the excavating is now being done in a different direction. The earth is being removed and the well walled up with rock, in order to prevent another such mishap. It is believed that by tunneling a short distance further toward the canyon channel that an abundance of water can be had. It is to be hoped that such will be the case as the water works thus far has been a dismal failure.

When the cave-in occurred, J. A. Anthony, the electrician, was down in the well inspecting the work. He saw the earth from above sliding in and just stepped aside and in the right direction to avoid being crushed to death. On the side he was standing the dirt only covered him to the knees. He was soon hauled out of his perilous position and feels sure that Fate was kind to him, otherwise he would have met with a terrible death. The cave came from the direction of the big boiler on the east and the dynamo on the north. The work of walling with rock is even a dangerous procedure, and is being done carefully.

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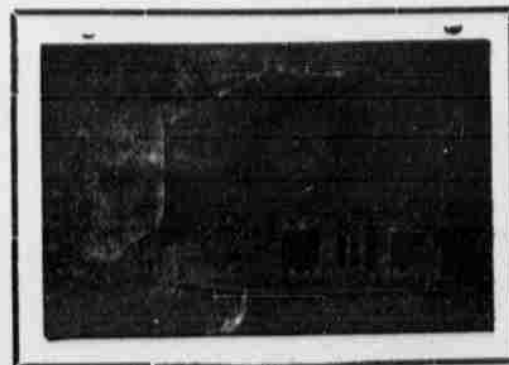
