The chairman appointed a committee of five to draw up a memorial to congress and a meeting has been called for Saturday September 21st, for the purpose of hearing the report of the committee. In the meantime the committee will talk with stockmen in general and find the sentiment of all on the matter.

Lakeview Lime.

Several months ago E. H. Loftus and C. H. Dalrymple became interested in a deposit of crude lime on the ranch of S. J. Prose, three miles north of Lakeview, and early in the summer began development work on the mine. The prospectors finally uncovered an immense ledge of lime rock which is said to be one that will furnish lime for strictly local consumption for a century, and for foreign consumption—should a railroad ever reach this country to transport it—for many years to come. This lime mine is likely to become a mine of wealth for the owners, for with quick transit to take it to other markets it will prove a paying industry, inasmuch as it is claimed by experts to be equal, if not superior, to the famous Santa Cruz lime. Mr. Loftus is always on the lookout for gold and says the lime rock contains the yellow metal to a certain extent, and may lead to a gold mine in reality.

The owners have already this first season taken out and burnt enough rock to make 63,000 pounds of pure lime. They now have with H. C. Rothe & Co. over \$1,000 worth of lime boxed and ready for the market.

Lakeview lime may yet become famous throughout the Pacific Coast.

Harkey and Ben Campbell. They brought \$28 for two year old steers and dry cows.
