PRESS FLAYS HEARST PAPERS.

Ever since the attempted assassination of President McKinley the whole people of the United States have been in a fever of suspense lest the next bulletin from his bedside might change the aspect from cheerfulness to gloom. The bulletin received in Lakeview Friday morning was distressing news. At that time it was announced that the President's condition was becoming alarming, owing to the failure of the heart to respond to stimulants. After an entire week of favorable convalescence Mr. McKinley was on Friday morning, according to a bulletin issued at 2 a. m. of that day in a serious condition, but later bulletins of the same day were more favorable.

The Eastern press is flaying Hearst yellow journals for their part in inciting anarchy which led to the attempted assassination of the President. The New York Press says:

"We have not to deal only with yellow journalism in panic, terror, boycott and bankruptcy. That remarkable institution attempts a metamorphosis over night. It is seeking to escape disguised as a clergyman from the poor wretches and hired assassins in this incident, yet for five years it has been conspiring, with every ignorant and reckless malcontent in this crime against the President's life, with every known contrivance for the incitement of popular hatred and contempt. Now it has undertaken the sacrilegious task of quoting psalms and making prayers for the President's recovery.

"The ribald hand that depicted him in every posture and attitude of degradation now seeks awkwardly to sound his apothecary. The perverted intellect which sought to justify assassination by pointing out the good effect of the murder of Lincoln is now proving the theory by the spectacle of its own abject conversion to decency and loyalty by the attempted murder of McKinley.

"This monstrous thing, whose venom has defiled every sanctity of public and private life among us, comes slobbering and whining to its knees in the presence of an angry nation, like an apprehended miscreant at the sight of the preparing of the stake and the approaching torch. Of all the nauseating forms that human depravity can take, this groveling avoidance of mankind's unavoidable conclusion as to the cause of this atrocity has been the most revolting."

The flickering spark of life went out at 12:40 o'clock on the 13th inst. The President is dead.

NATION TO CONTROL CORPORATIONS.

Vice President Roosevelt addressed twenty thousand people at the State fair grounds at Hamline, Minnesota, the other day. His speech was based principally on conditions as affecting labor and capital, and among other things he said:

"It is not only desirable but necessary that there shall be legal legislation which shall carefully shield the interests of the wage workers and which shall discriminate in favor of the humane and honest employer, by removing disadvantages under which he stands, when compared with unscrupulous competitors who have no conscience and will do right only when in fear of punishment. More and more it is evident that, the state, and, if necessary, the nation, has got to possess the right to supervise and control the great corporations, which are its creatures, particularly as regards the great business combinations which derive a portion of their importance from the existence of some monopolistic tendency."
