**ALTURAS FAIR!**

Opened Last Monday and will Continue for a Week, with the Promise of Much Success.

The Second Annual Fair of the Modoc county Agricultural Association was begun at Alturas last Monday, Sept. 16th, with a large crowd in attendance.

The first race on the first day was a 1/4 mile dash for 2-year olds. Alexander won. Purse \$100.

Second race was 1/4 mile and repeat free for all. Beleric won. Purse \$75.

Third race was trotting, mile and repeat. Senator Laird won. Purse \$100.

The Second day's program was begun with a ball game between the crack nine of Cedarville and Lakeview. It will be remembered that Cedarville beat the Lakeview team on the 6th of July at this place and again at Cedarville.

The game at Alturas Tuesday was the best ball played in this northern country and was won by Lakeview on the close score of 4 to 3. Lots of money changed hands on the game.

The races in the afternoon were a running 1/4 and repeat for 2-year olds, between Beleric, Sky Blue and Alexander. Beleric won. Time not given. Purse \$125.

2d race 1/4 dash, free for all, between Rita Sinfax, Lulu T., Bell Connor and George. Rita Sinfax won. Time not given. Purse \$100.

3d race trotting mile heats between Roy Duncan, Jenicks and Crescent. Roy Duncan won. Time not given. Purse \$100.

There was no ball game played the third day. Adin selected three of the Cedarville players; Lakeview protested, and as Adin refused to play without them the umpire promptly declared the game forfeited to Lakeview and placed as a score 9 to nothing. There will be a matched game played today between Lakeview and a picked nine.

**Borax in Warner.**

J. C. Brigham of the Pacific Coast Borax Works arrived here from San Francisco Monday and left for the Warner Salt Marsh yesterday in company with D. R. Jones. The borax Company have assayed samples of the Warner borax and pronounce it good and Mr. Brigham has come up to determine how extensive the borax fields are. If the borax deposits prove sufficient to justify putting up works, the Company will use the borax. This company handles all of the borax from J. M. Tilton's borax mine east of Warner, and Mr. Brigham tells The Examiner that it is of good quality. The Pacific Coast Borax Co., for many years hauled their borax 150 miles by 20-mule teams through Death Valley, but now a railroad runs to the works.

It all depends on the quantity of borax in Warner whether a train of 20-mule teams will be put on the road to Terms or not. The Examiner hopes to hear of an unlimited supply.

**Lakeview School Opens.**

Vacation is over and school commenced Monday with 169 scholars in attendance the first day, which is about the same as the beginning of last year's term. About 225 are expected to attend.

There are 10 grades and 66 classes in the school. In the 1st primary department, 1st and 2d grades there are 42 pupils. The 2d primary, 3d and 4th grades, there are 55 pupils. Intermediate department, 5th and 6th grades, 27 pupils. Advanced department, 7th and 8th grades are 35 pupils. High school, ten pupils. The rooms are tastefully decorated and new and old teachers are taking hold of the work with a vim that promises a good school term.

The new books have not yet arrived, but will be assigned when they come.

Few people in Modoc are aware of the rapid strides being made by the town of New Pine Creek, up on the Oregon line. A gentleman informs us that there are more than a dozen houses now in course of construction. "Why," said he, "Lakeview and Alturas are not in it with New Pine Creek when it comes to improvements."
