MODOC FAIR CONCLUDED.

A Good Race Meeting And Ball Game.

Since our last issue the Modoc Fair has come to a successful close after a full week of entertainment. The Examiner published the first two days program last week and following is the remainder up to its close:
The first race running, five eights dash, purse \$100. Entries, "Rieta Sinfax" by Mann, "Minnie G." by Godfrey, and "Lena C." by Sharp, "Rieta Sinfax" 1st, "Minnie G." 2nd.
Second race, mile dash, purse \$150. Entries, "Baleric" by Sharp, "Sky Blue," by Barnell, "Lulu," by Leonard, "Henry Guinn" by Henry, "Baleric" 1st, "Lulu" 2nd, "Sky Blue" 3rd, "Henry Guinn" last. Time 1:51.
Third race, trotting, best two in three, purse \$100. Entries "Captain Jack," by Drouillard and "Kinney Mc" by Crawley. Kinney Mc won both heats and money in 2:48.
Fourth race was an Indian horse race with five entries by Klamath Indians.

THURSDAY.

The first race was three eights and repeat for a purse of \$100. Entries, "Baleric" by Sharp, "Bell Conner" by Weigert, "Jim Foster" by Leonard, "Alexander" by Parker. First heat, "Baleric" 1st, "Jim Foster" 2nd. The second heat the horses came out the same and "Baleric" won the heat and money.

The second race was the 10 mile relay race. This race created more excitement than any race during the meeting. There was a string of horses entered by Ed. Ivory, and a string entered by James Poor. It was very exciting all the way through, some time one string being ahead, sometimes another. James Poor's string won the race and money on the last mile.

The third race was one-half mile dash, purse, \$150. Entries "Alexander" by Parker, "Sky Blue" by Crawley, "Henry Guinn" by Henry, "Buck Horn," "Henry Guinn" 1st, "Alexander" 2nd.

The first race Friday was 1 1/4 mile dash, free for all, with Lulu F., Gargo and Sky Blue in the field. Lulu won with Sky Blue second. Time, 2:16. Purse 300.

Second race, 1/2 mile dash for district horses. Baleric Rita Sinfax were entered. Baleric won in 49 3/4 track record. Purse \$100.

Saturday's first race was a 3/4 mile dash with Gargo, Jim Porteus and Minnie G., entered Porteus won, Gargo 2nd. Time 1:37. Purse \$100.

Second race was 1/2 mile heats free for all. Baleric, Alexander and Henry Guinn. Baleric won, Henry Guinn 2nd. Time 50 and 50 1/4. Purse, \$150.

Third race, trotting, best two in three, between Ruby J and Stella Marion. Stella won 1st and 3rd heats. Purse \$150.

The ball game Friday was played between Lakeview and Cedarville for the same purse of \$300, owing to some dispute Lakeview won again by a score of 3 to 7.

Road Land Bought.

Last Saturday Frank Lane bought 320 acres of road land adjoining Lakeview, in fact it nearly encircles the town. It begins at the race track west of town and is one continuous strip of land taking in that portion lying between his place now occupied by J. W. Mikel and John Clark's place in town. Then it runs up Deadman canyon for nearly 1/2 mile and goes north along the hillside to a point on a line even with the Slash road. Mr. Lane will at once begin the improvement of his property, and thus forego his trip to California for the winter as intended. The road from town will probably be moved up on the hillside to his old place, and the land will all be fenced. All the vacant land on the south will be laid out in town lots, and altogether it will be quite an addition to Lakeview. Mr. Lane will build a new residence next year some place on his newly acquired property.

A Timely Rain.

The country had become so dry in this county that a rain seemed absolutely necessary. Sheepmen were scrambling for feed which seemed to be almost entirely exhausted and they had been hoping for a storm for many weeks. Saturday the long looked for came with 10 hundredths of an inch; Sunday followed with 71 hundredths and Monday 10 hundredths, including some snow. The hills and mountains were white with the beautiful, and the sheepmen are now happy.

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
