

## SMALL POX IN KLAMATH

**There is No Doubt of the Disease Existing in Klamath Falls and Bly in Mild Form.**

The Ashland Record of last week reports six cases at Klamath Falls of the mild form of smallpox that has prevailed on the Pacific Coast the past two years.

Bob Wilcox has recovered and Frank Ward and L. Sloan are getting over it. Hark Willis, Chas. Wilson and the latter's father are now afflicted with the disease, and Joe Snodderly is getting over it.

They were all quite sick for about two days and then began to improve.

The Record also reports one case at Bly, the patient being Jack Miller. However, there appears to be good foundation for the report that there are several cases at Bly. Dr. Lee Steiner, who left here Friday morning for Portland, wrote to F. M. Miller, Mayor of Lakeview, that he was positive there was one case of smallpox at Bly, and in his opinion there were others. Mrs. A. F. Tonning and children, and Mrs. J. E. McGarrey, who went out on the same stage with Dr. Steiner, were advised by him as a physician not to go to the hotel at Bly and they followed his advice and had their supper and breakfast brought to them at a distance from the hotel, and found accommodations for the night in a hay barn. Dr. Steiner also advised in his letter to the mayor that a quarantine be put on the travel between Bly and Lakeview, and the fumigation of the mails. Dr. Steiner says there is no occasion for any alarm, but that precaution should be taken to avoid the spreading of the disease. It is the business of the county court with the co-operation of the county physician, to establish a quarantine, when considered necessary.

From other sources it is learned, how true it is The Examiner is not prepared to say, that a member of the Wells family, and Miss Taylor, residing at or near Bly has contracted the disease. It was also reported that there were other mild cases there, but nobody appeared to be alarmed about them.

Dick Moore, the Western driver, says he has never been exposed to the disease, as he only stops at the stable at Bly a short time, turning about and returning to Lakeview. Postmaster Wilcox says the postoffice and other places at Bly have been fumigated, but he does not know whether any drop mail from Bly is sent through the mails.

There was some talk that County Judge Willis would quarantine Klamath Falls, but it was not done. The victims and exposed persons at that place were notified to remain at home and off the streets. The public school was closed.

Pauline Meyers, the woman who is suspected of bringing the smallpox to Klamath Falls, was ordered out of town and placed on the Ashland stage on the 24th inst.

In order to protect our own town from this disease it is the duty of every physician in Lakeview to co-operate and go out to Bly and examine the cases there, to come to a satisfactory understanding regarding the nature of the disease, and should it prove to be smallpox without a doubt, then it is the duty of the officers in authority to establish a quarantine and fumigating station either at the county line, or at the edge of the city limits. It would seem that the common law would empower the authorities to protect their respective communities. The Examiner learns that the Klamath Falls schools have again convened and that the physicians of that town declare there is no smallpox there.

### Incident of the Neilson Trial.

An incident occurred during the progress of the Neilson case last Wednesday morning which created some little excitement. The prosecution endeavored to have the tax-roll for 1898 admitted as evidence, when the defense made vigorous objection on the ground that the roll in question had no warrant or clerk's certificate attached thereto to show it was the legal tax-roll of 1898 for Lake county—at any time the defense examined the roll. This was an intimation that the prosecution had attached the warrant or certificate during the progress of the trial, and to substantiate the charge Messrs. Cogswell, Bell and Hammond went on the witness stand and made oath that the said certificate was not attached to the roll before the trial opened, and argued that the roll was not admissible in evidence. On the side of the prosecution County Clerk Gunther and W. A. Wilshire made oath that the certificate was attached to the roll of 1898 from the time the roll was turned over by Clerk Batchelder during his term of office.

### Stock News

The W. A. Currier horses, four head of good ones, brought here last week by Mr. Currier, were sold to Joe Burrus for George H. Bayley, the government horse buyer.

Tom Partin, the Summer Lake stockman delivered 80 head of beef to Judge Smith of Altamont recently and he will start today with 75 more in company with Fred Foster, who will drive about 75 head. They will probably sell to L. Gerber.—Post.

Ed Stewart of Missouri has been in Modoc county for several weeks buying mules, and expects to be here in a few days to pick up what can be found in this vicinity for sale. He bought between 300 and 400 head in Modoc. He buys everything from yearlings up.

Dicks Bro's. of Crooked Creek have bought 110 tons of hay from Frank Houston in South Warner, and will feed 150 head of their yearling cattle at the Houston ranch this winter.

D. C. Berry and John Fisher, both of Davis Creek, passed through here first of this week on their return home from the railroad. Mr. Berry sold 60 and Mr. Fisher sold 100 beef cattle to Nally Willey, for the Western Meat Co., and these gentlemen delivered the cattle at the railroad.—New Era.

J. Early Boone, the prosperous young stockman of Plush, was a business visitor in Lakeview last Tuesday. Mr. Boone sold last Saturday ten head of fine mules to Mr. Hardy, who will ship the animals to Kansas City. The mules were yearlings and up, and averaged \$50 per head.

### Light Grain Crop.

The grain crop of Goose Lake valley fell far short of the usual amount this year. Cordell Thruston, who owns one of the threshing outfits, says he only threshed 34,631 bushels this season, against something over 58,000 bushels in 1900. Of this season's crop threshed by him 23,376 bushels was barley and 11,255 of wheat. There were short crops in every locality in the county, and that is the main reason for the present high price of flour in this valley. The same condition prevails in Modoc.
