

# SHOPS CLOSE AT RENO, NEV.

### Much Speculation as to the Probable Intention of the Owners of the N-C-O Railway.

There is some speculation as to what the N-C-O railway company expects to do in the near future. People along that line are anxious regarding the company's next move. The announcement is made that the Nevada-California-Oregon railway car shops at Reno have been closed down, that a large number of mechanics are thrown out of employment, and a monthly pay roll of \$10,000 in Reno to N-C-O employees is a thing of the past.

It is difficult to understand just what the company means by this move. It is probable that the company has arranged to transfer its business to some other location. The Reno Gazette says regarding the matter:

"Orders have been issued from the general office of the N-C-O Railway Company to finish up the work already under way in the car shops and then close the shops. It will take but three or four days to complete the work, then the shut down will come. This will throw a great many mechanics out of employment, which fact is to be deplored, coming as it does at the beginning of winter. Inquiry at the general office of the company failed to develop any satisfactory reason for this sudden change of program. Manager Dunaway saying, 'there will be no more cars built at the Reno shops.' Some time ago the N-C-O announced its intention to build a large number of cars and provided material for this purpose, buying iron by the car load and Oregon pine, sills, etc. Just what the company proposes to do with this material we are unable to learn. The foreman said he had orders to store the material that had been furnished for a new store house and an office for the superintendent of motive power, and the order for construction has also been countermanded.

It looks very much as though the N-C-O was going to transfer much of its business to some other point. Whatever the cause, this move on the part of the company is to be greatly regretted. The company has paid out something like \$10,000 per month for the past year, and we thought were making preparations to spend twice that sum, and would, had not the shop orders been cancelled."

### Death of Henry Klippel.

Henry Klippel, a pioneer of Jackson county, Oregon, died suddenly in Medford on Nov. 2d, of heart disease. Deceased was the father L. P. Klippel of Lake county. He was a prominent citizen, having held numerous positions of trust during his lifetime. Mr. Klippel arrived in Jackson county in 1851. Politically he was an uncompromising democrat. He had the reputation of being one of the most notable manipulators and managers of political affairs that Jackson county ever produced. Among the notable events in which he figured was the memorable Hayes-Tilden presidential election. He was one of the Tilden electors and it will be remembered that Oregon cut quite a figure in settling that contest. Mr. Klippel held the offices of sheriff and clerk of Jackson county, and held other important positions. He was nearly 68 years of age and leaves a widow and five children besides a large number of warm personal friends.

The letter is written on the stationery of the Mt. Shasta Hotel, at Dunsmuir, Cal., and is as follows:

"DUNSMUIR, Cal., Nov. 2, 1901  
"Governor of Oregon:

"My Dear Sir: We wish to have no trouble, nor do we wish to cause you trouble. We ask you to pardon and turn out of the Penitentiary at Walla Walla, Or., Edwin V. Tuismen, who is doing a 20 years' sentence. You will please pardon and release him from said prison inside of six (6) days from the receipt of this letter. And if you do not comply with the above inside of the time fixed above—six days—you will be treated to the same medicine McKinley got. If you want to save yourself and family you had better act at once—act at once and save trouble. If you do not do as above requested, you will be shot down without notice.

"I am writing this notice from above place, I live, or I should say we live—the parties who intend to carry out this scheme—part of us live here and part in Redding, California. They may live in some other country. Good bye. Please obey above and oblige.

### Time Will Tell.

Track laying was begun on the new extension of the N-C-O railway from Termo to Madeline two weeks ago. A Modoc correspondent has something new on railroad movements to the South. The latest is that the terminus will remain at Madeline for three years, when extension will be continued. Surveyors will be in the field all winter surveying for a broad gauge, and next Summer the line will be broad gauged from Reno to Plumas Junction, the year after to Amedee, and the next year to Madeline—then the broad gauge will be continued across the South Fork mountain leading toward the Oregon Short Line.
