

"ENGLAND'S SHAME!"

Startling Revelation Made by a London Newspaper of Frightful Mortality in Army.

A London dispatch under date of November 9 contains a startling revelation as published by the London Daily News regarding the death rate in the South African concentration camps. The dispatch says:

Lake a bolt from the blue come the revelations published this evening by the Daily News regarding one phase of affairs in South Africa. The public is thunderstruck by the exhaustive survey given by the Daily News of the concentration camps established by Lord Kitchener. It declares that the death rate in the camps is worse than anything that can be found in any other part of Africa or in Asia, and is even greater than the dreadful mortality in the Indian famine.

The figures of mortality are published and the article is accompanied by voluminous statistics proving every assertion made.

The Daily News urges upon the people to insist upon the camps being broken up. "Their continued existence," says the article, "will bring everlasting shame upon the name of England."

Nothing in recent times has created a greater sensation in England than the publication of these revelations. The Daily News, though it has taken a strong pro-Boer stand, is regarded as among the conservative London journals and its utterances have weight. It is anticipated that the government will be driven to take immediate recognition of the state of affairs disclosed by the publication of such startling accusations.

LONE PINE'S GOOD NEWS.

The telephone line from Lakeview, the capital of Lake county, to Silver Lake, the "North Star," has been completed.

Only recently the president of the company, the expert electrician and the "pole climber" had dinner at Lone Pine while on their way south to fill up the gap between Paisley and Heryford's Marsh ranch. After dinner and between "smokes," I gleaned the following information from President Wm. Harvey regarding the line:

From Paisley to Silver Lake the distance is 49 miles. The length of one coil of wire is a half-mile. No. 10 wire, double B extra was used on the line the entire distance. Work was begun at Lakeview on September 9th, and was completed on November 6th. Taking everything into consideration the job was accomplished in quick time and the work was exceedingly well done. The wire is tight and has the least sag of any line ever built in Eastern Oregon. The distance from Lakeview to Silver Lake, as near as I can figure it is 90 miles by the line.

From the day that Wm. Harvey started north on his stock-selling expedition, the people along the line became confident that the Lake County Telephone system was assured. Harvey is a matter of fact man, and knows not the meaning of the word "Fail." It took push and energy to accomplish the purpose, and when such men as W. P. Heryford, S. B. Chandler, George Conn and F. M. Chrisman, directors, enlisted with him to make the thing a success, there was nothing but success to be looked for.
