A baby weighing only a pound and a half was born in Columbus, Ohio, last week. It was necessary to place it in an incubator to insure its life.

One of the strangest cases on record is that of William H. Dubar, 80 years old, who lived four days with his neck broken. He was run over by an express wagon.

Seventy-four-year-old John Davenport who worried Dora Williams, aged 31, into promising to marry him, has changed his mind. She did not, and had him arrested. They finally settled the case by Davenport agreeing to give the girl a sewing machine.

James Clark was feeding corn stalks to a grinding machine at New Brunswick, N. J., last week when the knives clogged. He tried to clear them without stopping the machinery and was dragged head foremost in among the grinding rollers. Both arms were chopped off at the shoulders and his head and shoulders were ground into an unrecognizable mass.

George Fox, 65 years old, kissed his three grandchildren at his home at Patterson, New York, and then remarked: "Now, little ones, I am going away and won't see you again." When the mother of the children returned her girl told her of the strange action. She went out in the rear of the house and found her father with a bullet wound in his head. He was dead.

John Dobson of New Durham, N. J., who recently announced that he had fallen heir to an estate of \$33,000,000 in England, is being deluged with letters and photographs from women in all parts of the country who are anxious to share his fortune. Mr. Dobson has not answered any of the letters, and he says he will be a fit subject for an insane asylum if this thing continues much longer.

Reinhart Wisse paid a quarter in a Chicago church bazaar for a raffle ticket and then kissed the pretty woman who sold it. It was the biggest quarter's worth of his life. Two big fists were planted in his eyes, and after he had been soundly drubbed he was dragged home by his wife, who has a determined face and athletic figure. What he got after he passed from public view is a matter of conjecture.

Wasco county has a debt of \$111,588.08 while Sherman is out of debt and has \$10,000 cash in the treasury. Clackamas has a debt of nearly \$200,000. Marion county wiped out the last of its debt a few weeks ago, and Linn county has reduced its debt to \$30,000 by a recent payment of \$14,000 upon it. Grant county's indebtedness has been greatly reduced during the past four years, but little short of the \$100,000 mark.

Since H. O. Layton and his wife were wedded at Middletown, N. Y., their life has not been a "glad, sweet dream," and but a short time ago Mrs. Layton left her husband's house. Mrs. Layton said the other day: "I have been married four years and this is the third time I have been driven away from home by my mother-in-law. She has threatened my life with a loaded revolver and for days at a time has kept it within easy reach."

Fighting burglars with a fire extinguisher is the efficient and unique method that Ralph Shaw successfully used at Patterson, New Jersey last week. He heard screams in the house of Mrs. Clark, next door. He grabbed the fire extinguisher and rushed into the yard and saw the burglars in the cellar. Shaw entered the cellar and turned the stream

on. Two figures loomed up through a window and he was able to strike them squarely with the vile smelling liquid. He says the police can easily catch them if they take up the scent.

A Chicago judge has decided that any boy over 10 years old who is spanked by tea, her or parent has a remedy at law in the form of an injunction. "It does not do a boy any good after that," said the court, "and if fear does him much harm." These remarks did not escape the notice of some thousands of small boys. They bought newspapers, and with the words of the court heavily underscored, gave the papers to teachers and parents.

Residents of Black Patch, a town in Pennsylvania, who declare they have been bewitched for some weeks, are happy again. Black Annie, whom they accuse, has disappeared. The residents are Huns, and very superstitious. They say bread would not rise, cows gave poor milk, stoves smoked, dinners in the men's buckets turned to coal, children had weird dreams, and in a hundred small ways they were annoyed. It was resolved to tar and feather Black Annie, but she disappeared.

Forty young unmarried men of Geneva last week organized the Black Bean Club. It meets once a year and at that time a box containing forty beans, one of which is black, is passed around. The man who draws the black bean must get married before the next meeting. The expense of his wedding is paid from the treasury of the club, including the wedding tour and furnishing the house. The members do not know who draws the black bean until he is ready to announce his engagement.

Burns had a special election on Nov. 20th to vote on the question "Shall the city issue bonds to secure a water and electric light plant." When the votes were counted it was found to have lost by seven votes, 63 for and 70 against. A petition was circulated later to engage the services of a competent and reliable engineer to investigate and report the most practicable water and light plants for the present and future, together with a detailed statement of the cost of installing the same. Many persons who were opposed to the issuing of bonds have signed the petition.
