

RAPS HARD LUSK BILL

Characteristic Letter From "McCarty Come Down,"--High Old Time at a Wedding.

EDITOR EXAMINER:--Not seeing any correspondence from this place in your paper of late except an occasional squib from the Anti-Luskers, I thought a few items written in my old-fashioned disjointed way might be acceptable to you. The people ought to arouse themselves and shout loud and long--cry against this imposition from the very housetops--and let our grievances be known from the Pacific to the Atlantic; give notice to our representatives in Congress that this outrage must not be, and if they don't heed us let them take the consequences. The members of Congress from the Eastern States don't understand our case; they don't know what it is to live on a rimrock or lava bed; they have rich, deep soils, and thick forests where the solitary milk cow and the hog are staked with a 20 foot rope, and where they side hobble the red-eyed Billy goat. I'd like to know what sort of a living a ridge-rooter would make in this country on a 20-foot square of lava bed, while Mr. Lusk would hold the little meadows and springs and drive off his stock in winter to warmer quarters for them and himself, and leave us the privilege of fighting coyotes, jack rabbits, snow banks and mud till the robbers nest again. Mr. Lusk is very much interested in the small farmers, like the shark to the small fishes--"come in out of the wet."
