### The Yancy House Burned.

At 9:45 o'clock yesterday morning the alarm of fire was given and nearly all our townspeople rushed to the north end of town where the residence of J. P. Yancy was discovered in flames. This was the first genuine conflagration since the big fire of May 22, 1900, and of course the excitement was intense. The fire alarm in Lakeview very naturally gives the people a shock. Yesterday's fire had such a good start before the alarm was turned in, that it was impossible to save the property. The boys of Professor McEwen's department, as well as the teacher himself, rendered valuable assistance in saving household effects. The result was that everything in the house was saved, even to the doors and windows. All out-houses, including the granary, were also saved. A couple of hand fire extinguishers did good service. Mr. Yancy and family are living temporarily in a tent on the premises.

It is reported that J. E. Calderwood of Warner and Ft. Bidwell has been awarded the star route mail contracts from Terno to Ft. Bidwell, Alturas to Terno, and Terno to Alturas. It is possible that Mr. Calderwood may be awarded these contracts, but it is our understanding that no contracts will be awarded until Feb. 1st.
