In London, and Paris and in other capitals of Europe local railways, underground and on the surface, are in course of construction or will be begun at an early date. The tendency to improve the facilities for local transportation is widespread and seems now to have become irresistible in many quarters. Progressive communities with ample resources and conspicuous for population and advancement are entering upon notable tasks for the benefit of their citizens and of strangers within their gates.

Rapid transit is a watchword and a rallying cry both in the eastern and western hemispheres, and armies of workmen are toiling in subways, on elevated roads and on the street levels in dense and scores of well-known places here and abroad. But the principal cities of the globe are concerned with other great works than those which will effect the swift distribution of hosts of passengers. Schemes for the construction of new locks and piers on the most ambitious scale, for the deepening and broadening of harbor channels and for the opening of water avenues of commerce and trade in the best-known ports of various countries are more numerous and are planned on more generous lines than in any former era. And the provision of more abundant supplies of water for cities which consume huge quantities is drawing millions upon millions of dollars from municipal treasuries in the United States and in other countries.
