Representative Tongue intends, if possible, to put a stop to land frauds. He has introduced a bill providing that hereafter, when tracts within forest reserves are relinquished, the other lands selected shall be vacant surveyed public lands subject to homestead entry and shall be of approximately the same value as the lands relinquished. This bill was introduced after a conference with Commissioner Hermann, who gives it his hearty endorsement. A favorable report is also expected from Secretary Hitchcock, who is known to desire such legislation. Representative Tongue has also introduced a bill providing that adult heirs of any deceased Indian to whom a patent has been issued for lands allotted in the former Siletz Indian reservation may sell their inheritance; also a bill ratifying the agreement with the Grand Ronde Indians and appropriating \$28,500 to pay them for a tract of 25,791 acres thereby relinquished.
