Senator Bard, who, as a member of the Public Lands Committee, is conversant with the proposed legislation, said, on the 1st inst: There is some merit in the proposition to lease the public lands for grazing purposes, but I think the bill as it stands has no show of passing Congress. Nor do I think it should. It is a question that should be investigated sarefully. To my mind it would be better to place the matter in charge of the Secretary of the Interior, giving him discretion as to leasing lands. It is a common complaint of small settlers in the West who have taken up homesteads and are struggling to maintain a home, that they are overridden by the grazing interests. Many settlers use the vacant lands adjoining their claims for grazing their small bands of cattle. and in many cases they are deprived of gument that will do much towards their privilege. 



