

A MODOC FIRE. LAKE CUT OUT! MINERAL BELT.

Details of the Conflagration Two Weeks Ago at Cedarville.

The account of the fire on the 5th inst. at Cedarville, given in The Examiner of the 6th, was nearly correct, but the following account from the Record constitutes the facts: About half an hour after the Record went to press to-day, about 12:15 o'clock, the dreaded cry of "fire" was heard and at the same instant a dense volume of smoke was seen coming from the top of the old Brewery building, opposite the Record office. In a moment all was excitement, and the fire had made such headway that it was impossible to save the building. The wind was blowing from the south west, which meant the destruction of Wheeler's Soda Works, John Beck's residence, occupied by S. K. Drouillard, and the Masonic hall. A large crowd gathered and heroic work was done by all. Wheeler's Soda works caught from the burning building, and by hard work the residence occupied by Simon Drouillard was saved. Just as the Masonic hall and Beck's building seemed doomed the wind shifted and in a short time the fire was under control, which confined the loss to the Soda Works and brewery building, most of the contents of both buildings being saved. Everybody worked hard and the women are deserving of special credit. There was no insurance, and the loss, amounting to about \$2,000, falls on M. Oltenwater, L. A. Wheeler, T. H. Johnstone and W. Lee. The fire caught in the room occupied by Mr. Lee from a defective flue.

BIG BEARS IN ALASKA.

Beasts That Are as Fierce as the Grizzly and as Swift as the Horse.

Dr. William Lord Smith, of Worcester and Boston, lately returned from Kadiak island, on the Alaskan coast, where he passed several months hunting the big bears of the island. He brought home with him the skin of a 600-pounder, reports a Worcester (Mass.) correspondent of the Chicago Inter-Ocean.

The Kadiak bear is the largest member of the bear family. According to Dr. Smith, it is not a grizzly, although it somewhat resembles the silver tip of the Rocky mountains. It has the grizzly's head. It has been reputed to grow to enormous size, even to a weight of 2,000 pounds, but Dr. Smith was unable to get evidence that it exceeded 1,200 pounds, even in autumn, when very fat, ready for its long winter sleep. The fur, when in its prime, is a rich brown and very thick, but in the spring and early summer it is rather a grey than brown.

The Worcester hunter was accompanied by a Boston friend during his first few weeks on Kadiak. Their first day's hunting brought them a 625-pound bear, which fell to the rifle of the Boston man, the two having tossed a coin for the shot. The only other bear they got was shot by Dr. Smith on almost the last day of his hunting in the middle of July, more than two months after his arrival on the island. It was about 10:30 p. m., which was dusk in that latitude. The doctor and a native had followed the beast, and got within 30 feet of her. She was a mother with a cub along, and was fishing in the shallow waters of a little river.

The Kadiak bear is a fish eater, and this particular bear was in clover, for the dog salmon were running up stream in water only a few inches deep. She reached with her great paw, armed with claws more than three inches long, and with a quick sweep, tossed the salmon to the shore, where she killed and ate them.

Dr. Smith believes that the Kadiak bear almost equals the grizzly in fierceness, but he holds that neither bear is nearly so dangerous to hunt as their reputation would indicate. Their eyesight is poor, and they seldom see the hunter, and, unless wounded and cornered, they prefer to run rather than fight. The Kadiak bear has the speed of a fast horse. Dr. Smith has hunted big game in Africa and has killed lion, elephant, and rhinoceros, hunting on foot, but he has never seen any wild beast travel with such speed as the Kadiak bear. As for the danger, he would much prefer to shoot Kadiak bear than any of the big cats, so far as the risk of life is concerned.

A New Racing Circuit in Which Lakeview Should be Included.

A movement is on foot again to form a new racing circuit to include Red Bluff, Redding, Yreka, Cal., and Jackson and Klamath counties, Oregon. It was at first intended to include Lakeview in the circuit, but the Yreka Journal in mentioning the matter says nothing of Lake county, and we presume Lakeview will be cut out. Why this should be The Examiner is not prepared to say, but presumably somebody has informed the promoters of the new circuit that Lakeview did not want to be included. Lakeview should be included just the same, and so should Alturas, as the loop could be easily made from Klamath to Lakeview, to Alturas, thence to Red Bluff. It is our opinion that the people of Lake county would heartily welcome such a proposition from the leading spirits of the new circuit. If the Redding and Red Bluff newspapers will take up this matter there can be no doubt of the formation of the complete circuit. Why the circuit should wind up at Klamath Falls when there are two of the best racing towns in the north right on the loop, without going out of the way, we cannot conceive. Lakeview stands back for no town on the coast when it comes to that kind of sport.

A Railroad That May be First to Reach Eastern Connection.
