### LAURA LULA PERKINS.

One of the most distressing incidents of the week in Lakeview was the death of Mrs. Lou Perkins, a young woman who has lived here all her life. She was born at New Pine Creek, across the line in California, February 19, 1874, and died February 15, 1902, aged 27 years 11 months and 26 days. She professed faith in Christ in 1885 and joined the Methodist Church. She was the wife of George W. Perkins, to whom she was married in December, 1899.

On February 3d (this month) a little daughter came to brighten the home of the parents, but the mother was not destined to tarry long on this earth to guide the little one's footsteps. She never recovered from the illness, and after much suffering passed away at an early hour on Saturday morning. Those who knew deceased intimately are much grieved over her death. She was a good and pure woman and a loving friend, and Time will not efface her memory from the hearts of those who loved her. Cut off in the springtime of life by the cruel hand of Death, as the frosts of winter blight the bursting bud, her life half-spent on earth was not mis-spent—her reward is Heaven, the home of the Christian. Much sorrow is expressed for the husband whose wee first-born sobs for the dead mother's loving clasp.

Deceased was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Mulkey of Lakeview, and a sister of Mrs. C. S. Benefiel of Paisley, Mrs. Ned Dickinson of Mt. Vernon, Washington, Mrs. Frank Paxton of Lakeview, and Phil, Thomas, Frank, William, John, Bert and Ralph Mulkey.

The remains were taken to New Pine Creek, for interment, on Sunday. Rev. C. W. Holloman, of the Baptist church of Lakeview, conducted the services.
