BIG MEDICINE MAN

ESCAPES AND WRATHY INDIAN
KILLS GEO. HARRIS
Much Excitement in Indian Circles at Alturas Over Murder of Good Indian.

The jury is sitting in inquisition on the death of George Harris, the Indian killed, presumably in mistake for Charlie Turner, medicine man, found that the evidence (entirely Indian) tended to show that the two gun shot wounds on the body of deceased were inflicted by one Brown Dorris, but such evidence is not sufficiently conclusive to warrant the jury in finding that Brown Dorris fired the fatal shots. We therefore find the shots were fired by some one unknown to the jury.

There are some very bold, bad Indians about Alturas. The Plafidealer, speaking of the tragedy says: "Just why one people should take a hand in the killing of an Indian doctor we cannot understand. Better let them settle their own affairs in their own way. This doctor is a graceless, old scamp and has caused nearly all the trouble with these people. He committed murder in order to become a medicine man, and has worked his profession for all it was worth in money and horses, and the only feeling of regret among whites and Indians is that the wrong man was killed."

HYLENA A. NICKERSON

Hylena A. Nickerson, of whose serious illness The Examiner spoke two weeks ago, died at Ft. Bidwell, Cal. on the 27th inst. Deceased was 67 years of age, and the widow of Rev. Linus M. Nickerson, former Indian Agent at Klamath Agency. Up to about one year ago Mrs. Nickerson was a teacher of the Indian school at Ft. Bidwell, and then gave up her duties on account of illness of a tumorous type, which finally caused her death. Deceased leaves to mourn her loss three sons, Geo. S. Nickerson of Klamath Falls, Will W. Nickerson financial clerk of Klamath Agency, Rev. Roscoe S. Nickerson of Idaho, and her daughter, Miss Grace Nickerson now of Ft. Bidwell, in addition to many friends who greatly appreciated Mrs. Nickerson's kindly and generous character.

A correspondent from Ft. Bidwell in speaking of her death says: "During her stay here Mrs. Nickerson has made many friends and was universally loved and respected by all who knew her. Her bereaved relatives have the sympathy of the entire community. The funeral took place on Friday at two o'clock, the services being conducted by Rev. John Telfer who pronounced a beautiful and fitting eulogy on a life which has been above reproach."

Made His Escape

As mentioned in another column Joe Baumgartner of Salem has been paying Lakeview a visit. Besides private business that called the gentleman here it appears that his object was two-fold. He wanted to get as far away from the State Capital as possible until the "vaccination business" was accomplished in Salem. The account of his escape is told by the Salem Statesman in the following manner: Yesterday morning the Statesman published a small item regarding the school board's plan to vaccinate all the children in the public schools next week, and when, at 9 o'clock, Jos. Baumgartner, clerk of the board of directors—who receives all complaints intended for the board—reached the Ladd & Bush Bank, he found himself confronted by about fifteen irate ladies, who had called to protest against such a course. Among them were Christian Scientists and others who do not believe in vaccination, and they protested vigorously. So many were the complaints, and so insistent were the demands on the clerk that he should secure a countermand of the order complained of, that Mr. Baumgartner was almost in despair, and was not happy until he caught the 11 a. m. train for Southern Oregon, whence he will journey to Lakeview. He will be gone about ten days, and he hopes that by his return, the vaccination of the school children will be a thing of the past.
