Call For Republican Primaries And Convention.

Call for Primaries and County Convention by the Republican County Central Committee of Lake County, Oregon:

Republican Primaries for the purpose of electing delegates to the Lake County Convention are hereby called for

TUESDAY, MARCH 18, 1902,
at 1 o'clock p. m., to be held at the usual voting places in the several precincts of the county.

Voting Precincts and Delegates:
No. 1, Silver Lake 5 No. 2, Summer Lake, 2
No. 3, Chewaucan 6 No. 4, Crooked Crk., 4
No. 5, Drews Valley 5 No. 6, Goose Lake, 5
No. 7, North Warner 3 No. 8, South Warner, 3
No. 9, New Pine Crk. 4 No. 10, North L'vw., 11
No. 11, South L'vw., 6 No. 12, Thomas Crk., 1.

The above apportionment is one delegate at large for each of the precincts and one for every ten, and fractional part thereof of five or more of the votes cast at the last general election in the various precincts for Judge Wolverton.

The County Convention composed of the above delegates will meet in Lakeview, Oregon, at 10 o'clock a. m. of March 22, 1902, for the purpose of electing four delegates to the State Convention to be held in Portland on April 23, 1902; four delegates to the Congressional Convention for the First Congressional District of Oregon, to be held at Roseburg, Oregon, on April 1, 1902, and to nominate candidates for the various County offices to be voted for at the General Election in June, 1902, and for the transaction of such other business as may come before the Convention.

A resolution was passed at the meeting of the County Central Committee to the effect that in the event of delegates being elected who cannot attend the County Convention they surrender their proxies to some member of their own delegation.

WILLIAMSON LOSES WASCO.

It is said that in the contest in the Wasco county primaries on March 1st, between Representative Moody and State Senator Williamson, the former was victorious, getting a plurality of 35 votes in the county convention. Three out of four of the Dalles precincts were carried by Moody. Senator Williamson spoke of the result as follows:

I consider that my friends made a good showing in Wasco County. It is one thing to talk about unthorsing a live Congressman in his own home county and quite another thing to do it. Under the circumstances I do not see how any other construction can be put upon the result than that I received handsome support in Wasco County. Take Antelope precinct, for example. I lost it by one vote. In the Dalles, a city of 6000 inhabitants, I lost by less than 20 votes. I do not consider my chances for nomination materially impaired by the result in Wasco County."

IRRIGATION BILL PASSED.

The Irrigation bill has been passed by the Senate of the United States. The irrigation measure provides that all moneys received from the sale of public lands in Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North and South Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, Utah, Washington and Wyoming, beginning July 1st last, be devoted to the construction of necessary irrigation works for the reclamation of arid lands, the work to be done and the money expended under the direction of the Secretary of the Interior. The bill was under discussion for several hours, but encountered no opposition and was passed without a rollcall.

LAKE ENTITLED TO NAME THE REPRESENTATIVE.

Lake County is entitled to the Representative in the State Legislature this year, and we should ask our neighbor Klamath to cooperate with us in the selection of a nominee. Klamath had the honor at the last election and it is only right that Lake send the Representative this time. Lake can send a strong man—one who will do honor to the position as well as to his constituents.
