### WHEN THE MASTER SPEAKS.

It was all fixed by the Lakeview Ring several days ago, we had just as well stayed at home—a white haired delegate from the country.—Lakeview Rustler.

"Yes; yes." That old and rusty war cry, "Republican Ring," creates terror in the camp of the enemy. It is their only weapon, and a weakly one at that. It eases the mind of our contemporary, as an offset to the one-man convention held in Lakeview last Saturday. Although he was not in evidence on the floor of the convention, who among us, subservient slaves to his will, can truthfully contradict the statement that there is a master and a "boss" in the house of Democracy in Lakeview? "Foreed" (?) as was the "boss" to accept a nomination at the head of the Democratic county ticket, the aspirations, of our good friend who wields the canister pen at the Rustler office were shattered and cast to the four winds.
