DON'T BE MISLED.

The friends of Dr. Daly in his campaign for County Judge are endeavoring to make the people believe that if elected he will give Lake county a better business administration than it has had during the incumbency of Judge Tonningsen.

He would certainly carry out the wishes of the people whom he has hoodwinked for years past; he would give Lake county an excellent "business administration"—for Dr. Daly. That can safely be depended on. He has placed himself at the head of a combination that is rapidly growing into the shape of an octopus to absorb everything in its way. Lake county today owes hundreds of thousands of dollars at any time since a Democratic administration placed it in a state of despondency by a wreck of the slough of public funds.
