THE REPUBLICAN TICKET.

In the editorial column of The Examiner today will be found the Republican ticket to be voted for the June election—complete with the exception of the minor precinct nominees. The day tomorrow is held for each precinct on the regular ballot on election day. The Republicans of Oregon have placed in the field for the various city and district offices a list of candidates that they may well feel proud of. At the head of the ticket is a man who will do honor to the position of chief executive of the State. No better administration could have been secured in the State. His record in the past is a guarantee of his ability to do the best for the State. From his record the golden rule of the Republican party, "All eyes on the people," is clearly seen. Let us stand these words that Oregon is with in the Republican camp by a tremendous majority.

From now on every election day The Examiner will have considerable to say regarding the local ticket. There is no good reason why the entire Republican county ticket should not be elected by a vast majority. If Republicans will do their duty and vote for the county officers they vote for the state and district nominees, then may the hand of justice be poured down on Lake county for gallant work.

While Thomas H. Torque is sure of reelection, it is the duty of the people of his district to return him to Congress by a larger majority than ever before. Our Congressman is just now a power at Washington and his record is one to be proud of. He is right on all the important questions before the country, and especially is he strong and faithful to the people on the public land leasing question—the most vital question of the people of this county that ever came up for public discussion. To show that we are sincere in our anxiety on this question let us roll up a magnificent majority for Mr. Torque for each year, so he will be needed in Congress to fight against the

infamy that the cattle barons of the country are determined to force upon us.

And, in this matter, a careful regard should be held for the men whom we are to send to the State Legislature to vote for a United States Senator. R. A. Emmitt of Klamath has been tried and found true to his constituents. Messrs. Whoulden and Burgess, the other two Republican nominees for Representative are men of ability and are with the people against the land leasing scheme. Let the watchword of the people of this county be: "Study men who are true to our interests will get our votes!"

ALL EYES ON OREGON.

The first election of 1902 is that which will come off in Oregon. It will take place on June 2, a little less than two months hence. The Republicans have put upon good ticket and have framed a platform on which their party all over the country could consistently stand. It comes out strongly in favor of the retention of the Philippines, attacks the trusts, advocates protection to domestic industries which need it, declares for the continuation of the exclusion of the Chinese, and favors the adoption of a sensible system of irrigation.

For years past the Republicans have been carrying Oregon. The Demo-Pop fusion won it in 1892, and the Bryanites came so near winning it in 1896 that McKinley's plurality was only a little over 2000 in that state. That was the time when the silver wave was sweeping over the greater part of the country west of the Mississippi. By 1898 Oregon regained its political balance, and the state was carried by the Republicans by a 10,000 plurality for governor that year. It gave 12,000 of a lead to McKinley and Roosevelt in 1900. Its delegation in both branches of Congress belongs to the Republican party, and usually has for a few years past.

There can be no doubt that Oregon will roll up a handsome plurality for the Republicans in the election a few weeks hence. That state elects two members of Congress on that day, as well as state officers, and near the election will have an interest for the whole country. It will vote on National issues, and on National issues the Republicans ought to get a heavy Congress, and most of the time since success has come to us in the past. The Republicans are strong in the grass-roots, and especially in the "back of the seat." National character and the general question of management development with which the party has been identified are popular with the country, and the country with the mood of the present time to give emphasis to its views on these and other great issues. The Republican party expects to lose grand news from Oregon on the night of June 2.

The Oregon Republican expect to roll up a good-sized majority for their ticket. More than once that June election in Oregon has given encouragement to the Republican party of the country in important National campaigns. There is good reason to suppose that the same state will rise to the importance of the occasion in the present instance, and by the magnitude of its Republican vote, inspire enthusiasm in the party in the rest of the country. The eyes of the United States will be on that historic battle commonwealth for the next few weeks.

Thos. H. Torque has made Oregon a most excellent representative in Congress. His work in behalf of his district and the State speak his praise louder than words. He should be re-elected and no doubt will be so long as he can hold up such convincing arguments of his fitness as what he has accomplished for Oregon Indians. His influence grows with his experience in Congress, and even more may be expected in the future than he has done in the past.—Fleming Statesman

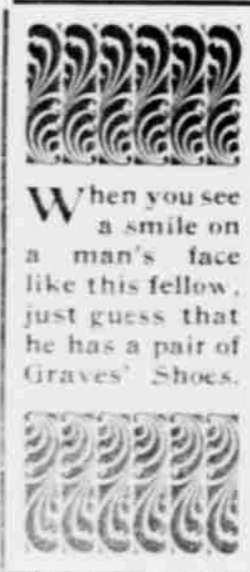
