

# Figures Taken From the County Records!

**The Jumbled, Conglomerated Mass of Unreliable Stuff Fixed up by the "Rustler" Lightning Calculator Disproved by the Records of Lake County and a Pleasing Campaign Story is Properly Nipped in the Bud!**

Owing to the fact that there are many conflicting reports in circulation in relation to the financial condition of Lake County, and particularly covering a period of time from July, 1898, to April, 1902, I make the following statement taken from the Records in my office and in my custody, which shows the amount of money received and on what account the same has been disbursed:

The former statement shows that \$40,907.82 was paid out for the redemption of County warrants and interest, and the latter \$47,067.46 making a total of \$87,975.28. The last mentioned statement shows a balance on hand April 1, 1902, of \$25,242.68 of which amount \$15,148.53 is applicable to the payment of County warrants, and that amount was called in by the Treasurer on the 3rd day of April, 1902, making a grand total paid for redemption of County warrants and interest from July 1898 to April 3, 1902 of \$109,122.81.

The records show that during the period of the time from July 1898 to April 1, 1902, County warrants were issued amounting to \$70,487.17; that would leave a difference of \$29,635.64 paid out for redemption of warrants over and above the amount of warrants issued during said time.

Then the estimated accrued interest on said \$70,487.17 would be \$5000.00; taking into consideration that several thousand dollars of the warrants included in said \$70,487.17 have been redeemed, in fact all warrants issued, that have been protested by the County Treasurer up to and including the 14th day of November 1899, have been redeemed, this \$5000.00 deducted from

\$29,635.64 would leave a balance of \$24,032.64, the net reduction of Lake County's indebtedness during said time from July 1898 to April 3, 1902. The total indebtedness of Lake County on the 1st day of April, 1902, was \$90,752.45, and on April 3rd 1902, County Treasurer Lee Beall called in and has paid \$15,147.53 reducing said indebtedness to \$45,604.92.

Now, about estimating what the indebtedness of Lake County would be on April 1, 1902. The average yearly running expenses of Lake County are \$16,000.00; however, I will make my estimate on my last report, covering the time from October 1, 1901, to April 1, 1902. Said report shows that \$16,084.93 has been issued in County Warrants, \$8,538.93 for County purposes and \$14,292.00 for County purposes and \$14,292.00 for scalp bounty, making a total of \$32,169.80 of this amount \$14,292.00 for scalp bounty purposes the State would reimburse Lake County in the sum of \$9,528.00, which is applicable to the payment of County Warrants. Then on the 1st day of April 1902 there was remaining unpaid taxes on the Assessment Roll for the year 1901 which is applicable to

the payment of County Warrants, the sum of \$3,740.00. And the amount of money received for fees and other sources which is turned into the General Fund and is applicable to the payment of County Warrants averages \$2000.00 yearly, making a total of \$15,268 applicable to the payment of County Warrants. The total indebtedness April 3, 1902, was \$45,904.92, estimated amount of warrants issued for preceding year \$32,169.86, and estimated interest accrued on sum total \$3,300.00 making a grand total of \$81,074.78. Now deducting the amount applicable to the payment of County Warrants \$15,268.00, would leave the indebtedness on April 1, 1903, \$65,806.78. Then, in January 1903 the Sheriff would receive the Assessment Roll for the year 1902, and the amount on said Roll applicable to the payment of County Warrants, taking in consideration the Roll for the year 1901, would be \$22,000.00, thus again reducing the indebtedness to \$43,806.78 at a date between April 1st and 15th, 1903.

The foregoing statement is made on the very highest rating I could give, and in my opinion could not reach the figures given, for the following reasons:

- 1st. I do not think there will be as many scalps of wild animals presented in the coming year as were presented the past year.
- 2nd. Heretofore warrants were issued on the General Fund for the building and repairing of County roads; now there is a road fund with \$2,603.53 therein, which is an ample amount to put the roads in condition for the coming year.
- 3rd. The small pox epidemic was an unavoidable expense of \$1,130.82, which we trust is stamped out.
