

LAND LEASING BILL HUNG UP— THE MEN TO VOTE FOR!

As will be seen in another column of The Examiner today, the public land leasing bill has been shelved for the time being. But the agitation will not be allowed to die out, and a renewed and determined effort will be made at the next session of Congress by the cattle barons and land monopolists to pass the measure. Voters of the First Congressional district should remember that the people have a staunch and able friend in Thos. H. Tongue, who has, and will continue to use, every effort to defeat the land leasing bill. Such a man is needed in Congress to fight this robbing scheme. Let the people of the First District show the country they are in earnest in this matter by re-electing Mr. Tongue by an overwhelming majority—and at the same time show Mr. Tongue that the common people of this district appreciate his efforts in their behalf. Every poor man and small stockman in Lake county, regardless of party ties, should cast his ballot for Thomas H. Tongue on the 2nd of June. And sight should not be lost of the fact that a United States Senator will be elected by the Legislature of this state, and the men elected Representatives from this district will assist in electing that Senator. Emmitt, Burgess and Whalton, Republican nominees for Representatives in this district, are against land leasing, and if elected to the Legislature will oppose any candidate for the United States Senate who is not unalterably opposed to the measure. To subserve their own interests every small stockman and homesteader, and every laborer, should vote on June 2nd for Tongue for Congress, and Emmitt, Burgess and Whalton for Representatives.

And getting down to local affairs, it should be remembered that a staunch friend of the leasing measure is the Democratic nominee for County Judge. Of course no one blames him for being friendly to the measure for he is at the head of a big corporation established in Lake county for the purpose of buying lands and raising and selling cattle. It is but serving his own personal interests and the interests of his corporation friends and wealthy stockmen that he would naturally favor the land leasing robbery, which is destined to kill off the very industry that makes Lake county a rich and prosperous section—the business of the small stockman. The Examiner mistakes the disposition of the people of Lake county if they cast their votes on June 2nd to place in power, even locally, a man who is fast becoming a monopolist, and who will, if the land leasing bill passes, take advantage of the privilege offered him to lease at two cents an acre in the neighborhood of Fifty Thousand Acres of government land in Lake county, to carry on a big stock raising enterprise.

The jealousy caused by the nomination of W. J. Furnish for Governor in place of Judge Lowell has not been subdued, and ardent friends of the defeated candidate seem determined to assist in the defeat of the man at the head of the Republican ticket in this state. We wonder if these people will continue to call themselves Republicans? And the people are wondering if Judge Lowell does not feel like a renegade after declaring his intention to vote for Mr. Chamberlain. W. J. Furnish will be elected despite the jealous enmity of these men, and then they will feel like a lot of fools.

Chas. Nickell, of Jacksonville, wanted to be nominee for state printer, on the Democratic ticket and because he couldn't get it, broke the slate. The convention was wise in not nominating Mr. Nickell. It is doubtful if he could ever be elected to any office. He is in the habit of working off peculiar tricks once in awhile that people do not like and do not forget. He is not hardly of the caliber for a state officer anyway.—East Side Herald.
