"It is not reprehensible to startie attention and thereby hold thought. Show me a fine church and a large congregation and I will show you a sensational preacher. This sensationalism is required. What I do not approve of, however, is spectacular preaching-a succession of cute sayings, clownish actions and startling assertions that have nothing in them.
