Sensational Preaching All Right.

Rev. T. S. Young of San Jose maintained in an address before the Baptist Union recently that qualified sensational preaching was effective and desirable. He said in substance:

"It is not reprehensible to startle attention and thereby hold thought. There is a place for sensational preaching in the effort to reach the people. Neither age nor youth determines the success of the preacher. Some men are born old and are dead long before they cease to breathe; some men will never be old and they retain their power of attracting. We have need of this attracting, sensational preaching if you will. Show me a fine church and a large congregation and I will show you a sensational preacher. This sensationalism is required. What I do not approve of, however, is spectacular preaching—a succession of cute sayings, clownish actions and startling assertions that have nothing in them.

"There has come an inclination in the ministry to avoid studiously all sensationalism until some become mere preachers of platitudes. A kind of preaching that will arrest thought, holding it on some great truth or fact is needed. The mountebank of the pulpit so abuses this that pure gospel preaching seems impossible in connection with any sensationalism. Yet, some of the acknowledged sensational preachers have had their best efforts rich in gospel truth. Do not cultivate yourselves to the degree of grotesqueness, but cultivate along special lines, as have some of the greatest preachers of the day."
