The Lake County Agricultural Association will give four days racing on their track in Lakeview, commencing July 1 and ending July 5, 1902. The sum of \$1,300 will be distributed in purses, as follows:

FIRST DAY, JULY 1.

First Race, 5-8 Mile dash, \$150.00 (Three-year olds)

Second Race, 3-8 Mile heats, 150.00

Third Race, 600 Yard dash, (Lake Co. saddle horses), 75.00

SECOND DAY, JULY 2.

First Race, 5-8 Mile dash, 125.00

Second Race, 1 Mile dash, 175.00

THIRD DAY, JULY 3.

First Race, 1-2 Mile heats, 150.00

Second 3-4 Mile dash, 125.00

FOURTH DAY, JULY 5.

First Race, 1-8 Mile dash, 200.00

Second Race—Distance to be named at Race Track on afternoon, July 3d 150.00

There will be a Consolation Purse, distance and amount named the last day.

CONDITIONS:

All of the above races are free for all, except saddle race, which is for Lake county horses. Four to enter and three to start, but the Association reserves the right to hold a less number than four to fill by reducing the purse in proportion to the number of horses entered.

Entries to close the evening before the race. The Pacific Coast Blood Horse Association rules to govern all running races. Entrance fee ten (10) per cent of purse. Money to be divided as follows: 70 per cent to the first horse and 30 per cent to second horse.

The Association reserves the right to change any of the above races, in the event of not filling, or to change the date of the last day's event to the following day, in case any other amusement is announced for that date. No money paid without a contest.
