

## RENO'S GREAT WOOL DEPOT

Flannigan Warehouse Company Will Establish Competitive Bidding System at Reno

RED BLUFF, April 26.—The Northern California wool market has been very active here during the week. About 3000 bags of wool were sold and over \$300,000 paid to the woolgrowers of this section. The clip this spring is a very fine one, and prices are ranging from 15½ to 16½ cents. There never has been so much rivalry between buyers as was witnessed during the week. Much of the wool was sold before it was taken from the sheep's back.

Somewhat of an idea can be gained from the above clipping, of the great benefit the Flannigan Warehouse Co. will be to the wool growers of this section. Ordinarily but few wool buyers enter this market and, in the past, there has been, practically, no competitive bid-dings. George Conn, the Paisley merchant and farmer, is having good success growing alfalfa on land that is called "Oregon Desert." He has 800 acres which he intends to plant to alfalfa putting in 40 to 50 acres each year. Some of it can be watered but the biggest part is not subject to irrigation. The Post says: "Last spring, about the last of May he sowed 40 acres to alfalfa on what he terms 'Oregon desert,' and now he has as good a stand of alfalfa as any body ever saw in this country. The growth was made without water, and he claims it is far better to start alfalfa without water, as it forces the roots to run straight down in search of moisture, while if the ground is kept thoroughly irrigated from the time the alfalfa is sown, the roots will sprang out only a few inches under the surface of the ground. Alfalfa will go to moisture if it is possible and if the moisture can be had at the top of the ground the roots find sufficient substance to maintain the fodder without running into the ground any depth, thus when a dry spell or a hard freeze happens to come it is easily killed out."

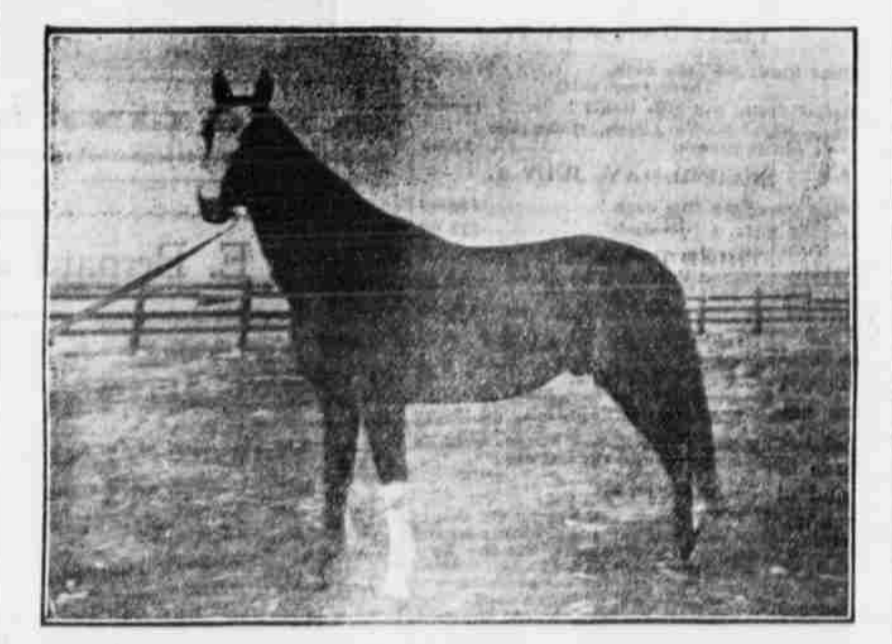
