In the coming Oregon election the Republicans expect to roll up a handsome majority for their ticket of two Congressmen and State officers. Oregon is the first State to hold her election, which will be in June. On many previous occasions the Oregon election has encouraged and enthused the Republican party of the country. The State is now safely Republican, although it went for fusion in 1892, and in 1890 as the result of the silver craze, McKinley had only two thousand plurality. The Republicans have this year put up a good ticket and stand upon a platform which comes out strongly in favor of the retention of the Philippines, attacks the trusts, advocates protection of domestic industries which need it, declares for Chinese exclusion and favors irrigation. The Democratic platform, on the other hand, demands the withdrawal of the United States troops from the Philippines. The country will watch with considerable interest as to how the two propositions are received by the people of the Pacific Coast commonwealth.

McBroom Heirs to Sue.

The suit of Mrs. Allie Van Buren against the Mountain Copper Company to recover \$20,000 damages for the death of her husband at the mine was given to the jury yesterday, which brought in a verdict for \$15,000. The real loser by the verdict is the Employer's Liability Insurance Corporation of England, which assumes all damages awarded employees of the Mountain Copper Company.—Miner.
